stop a pair of maddened runaway horses, will cost him his life. He swerved the runaways from the course that would have meant death and injury to many spectators along the route of a parade.

The accident had its pathetic aftermath in Waltham City Hospital to-night, where the motorman lay dying. While hundreds were discussing the bravery that he displayed, his wife kneeling by his battered form in the ward given over to critical cases, begged that consciousness might come, so that she might know the comfort of words from his lips before death ensued.

The physicians hold out no hope of the man's recovery. His skull is fractured and both legs broken. Robertson, who is employed by the Middlesex and Boston Street Railway Company, was on the way to the car arms, when he joined the sightseers on Main street, who were watching a parade of the New England Order of Owls. The screech of a locomotive whistle frightened a pair of horses hitched to a furniture wagon on Rich street, and in an instant they were off, dashing into Prospect street and from that thoroughfare into Maine street.

While women and children screamed and men dashed to places of safety Robertson rushed into the street just as the animals bore directly for the sidewalk where scores of people were gathered. He leaped for the bridle of the off horse, missed his grip and fell. The iron-shod hoofs struck him on the head as the horses passed and the wheels of the heavy wagon rolled over both legs.

The brave act caused the horses to dash away in another direction, both bringing up against a trolley pole, here they were held and finally subdued. Then Robertson was taken to hospital, where his name was placed on the dangerous list.

LATER

The funeral of John H. Robertson, the motorman who sacrificed his life on Columbus day in trying to stop a runaway team of horses that threatened to dash into a crowd of women and children near the corner of Main and Hammond streets, was held yesterday afternoon at the home, 247 Charles street. There was a very large attendance, more than the house could accommodate, and many people stood in the yard during the service. There were many beautiful floral tributes, including one large set piece representing a trolley car bearing the dead hero's number, 103.

The services were conducted by Rev. Newton M. Simmonds of the First Baptist church and William Upham of Brocton sang "Home at Last." Friends and relatives in large numbers, officials and associate employees of the Middlesex & Boston Street Railway, attended the funeral of John H. Robertson, which was held yesterday afternoon at 2.30.

A service was conducted at the house by Rev. Newton M. Simmonds, and interment took place in Mt. Peake cemetery under the direction of Undertaker George W. Osborn.

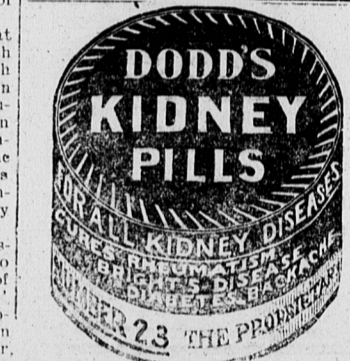
