It is understood that arrangements have been about completed for the taking over by a company of L'Evangeline newspaper, published in Montreal by V. A. Landry, J. A. The weekly issue will be continued for the present, but the intention is to bring out a semi-weekly or daily issue in the near future.

The sale of the estate of the late James Frederic Curtis, City, took place yesterday and was conducted by W. A. O. Morson, Master in Chancery. Four properties were disposed of and the purchasers were Mrs. R. B. Huestis, City, bought two properties, on the corner of Queen and Euston streets and the one adjoining, the former bringing \$1205 and the latter \$595; The property formerly occupied by Ball Bros as a meat shop sold to Dennis McQuaid, City, for \$830 and H. J. Palmer purchased the three tenement house opposite Peter McGrath's for \$1405.

Voting took place April 12 in connection with the vacancy in St. Cuthbert's Church, Edinburgh, caused by the translation of Rev. Dr. Wallace Williamson to St. Giles's Cathedral. The only candidate voted upon was Rev. George B. S. Duncan, Inveresk Parish, and the vote resulted—542 for Mr. Duncan and 7 against. There was one spoiled paper.—The above is from the British Weekly of April 21. Rev. Mr. Duncan is a son of Rev. Thomas Duncan, formerly for twenty years pastor of St. James' Church in Charlottetown and was born here. During the past four years he has been the pastor of Inveresk Parish, Musselborough, near Edinburgh. St. Cuthbert's Church, to which Mr. Duncan has now been called, is an important charge, and is considered to be next in importance to St. Giles's Cathedral in Edinburgh. St. Cuthbert's is situated at the west end of Prince's Gardens, close under Edinburgh Castle. It is hoped to print in The Guardian Rev. Mr. Duncan's induction sermon in the near future. His friends and relatives in this city will be glad to learn of his preferment.
