WELL KNOWN CLERGYMAN PASSES AWAY

Canon V. E. Harris Dies at Home of Daughter in Halifax — Had Brilliant Record.

HALIFAX, Dec. 12.—Canon V. E. Harris, aged 71 years, one of the best known and most beloved clergymen of the Church of England in the diocese of Nova Scotia, passed peacefully away at four o'clock yesterday afternoon, at the home of his daughter, Mrs. (Dr.) G. A. MacIntosh, 253 1-2 Robie street.

Following a life of intense activity, Canon Harris relinquished the work of the ministry last July, his final post being that of hospital chaplain. Three weeks ago, when his strength began to rapidly decline, he was brought from his home in Bedford to his daughter's residence, where he remained until his death.

The body will be taken to All Saints' Cathedral, of which he had been a Canon since 1918, at ten o'clock this morning, and will lie in state there all day. A funeral service will be held at the Cathedral at 3:30 o'clock this afternoon. On Tuesday the remains will be conveyed to his birthplace at Annapolis Royal where interment will take place in Oak Hill cemetery, the resting place of the remains of his father and mother and members of the family of previous generations.

Gave Life to Work

Born in Annapolis Royal on April 16, 1856 the late Canon grew to manhood in Nova Scotia, was educated in the schools of the province, and gave practically his entire life to the development of the religious and moral life of her people.

He attended the public schools at Annapolis Royal from which he went to Kings College, Windsor. He had a brilliant scholastic record. Among his college mates were Canon Osborne Troop, Archdeacon Vroom and Canon Morris.

Too young at graduation for ordination, he spent one year as headmaster at St. Peter's School, Charlottetown.

His first parish was at Londonderry, at that time a flourishing and industrial centre. There he labored with marked success from 1879 to 1882. In recent years he showed his continued interest in his first parishioners by frequent visits to his old church and the holding of confirmation classes there. He built the parish hall that now stands in that place.

Effective Service

Canon Harris found an opportunity more commensurate with his zeal and energy in the town of Amherst where he served brilliantly and effectively for seventeen years, first as vicar, under Rev. Canon George Townsend, and later as rector. Under his guiding hand the work of the church was greatly extended. A parish house was built at Amherst and missions were established at Fort Lawrence, Tidnish, Joggins, River Hebert, Maccan and other smaller towns and villages. Several small churches were constructed.

In 1901 ill health compelled him to take a rest. He spent a year in England and some time at Mattapan, Mass. His next change brought him to Halifax county, the parish of Sackville, then comprising Bedford Sackville, Hammonds Plains, Beaver Bank and Windsor Junction engaged his time and attention until 1910. The work in that district is now apportioned to three clergymen.

Untiring Zeal

Seventeen years ago he succeeded Rev. W. J. Ancient, as clerical secretary of the diocese of Nova Scotia. While engaged in this work his untiring zeal led him to undertake much missionary endeavour.

He conducted Sunday services at Londonderry, Oxford, Indian River and other places. He also served about three hundred Russians at a mission in Halifax. With a diligence and perseverance he mastered the Russian language and was enabled to preach to them in their vernacular. This was at the time when foreign labor was brought to the city to aid in the construction of the Ocean Terminal.

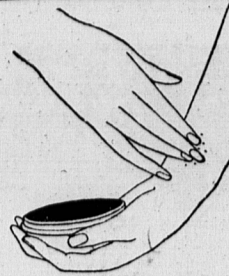

als. Educational matters came in for a considerable share of the late Canon's time and energy. He was secretary to the Board of Governors of Kings College, from 1911 to 1924. His scholasticism and devotion to his alma mater were recognized at the 1915 convocation of Kings, when he was honored with the honorary degree of D. C. L.

His love for the sick and distressed found expression in his work as hospital chaplain. So engrossed did he become in his labor of love to the sick that, in February, 1926, he relinquished his post as diocesan secretary and devoted practically all his time to this work. About four months ago, however, with the decline of his own health, he was forced to relinquish the chaplaincy.

Loved Native Land

Canon Harris always took a prominent part in synod meetings. He was especially active in his efforts to divide the diocese and increase

the episcopate. The esteem in which he was held by his brethren was widened by the fact that he was always a delegate of the Provincial and General Synods.

Officers of larger and more distant fields of labor did not tempt him to leave his native Nova Scotia. Ohio, Massachusetts and California parishes were offered to him but in vain. He loved his native province, gave to it his best and remained there, faithful to the end. He gave more years of service to his church than any other priest living at the time of his passing.

The late Canon Harris was one of twelve children of which the Chief Justice is now the sole survivor.

He is survived by his wife, who prior to her marriage was Miss Emma C. Troop, daughter of Hon. William B. Troop, M. L. A. of Granville, Annapolis county, one son, Reginald V. Harris, K. C., Halifax, Prothonotary, and two daughters, Mrs. G. A. MacIntosh, Halifax, and Mrs. T. H. Griffiths, Los Angeles.

TRADE ENVOY TO JAPAN VISITS CITY

States Market is Opening for Prince Edward Island Foxes in Orient.

Mr. James A. Langley, the representative in Japan of the Federal Department of Trade and Commerce, who has been spending a few days in the city states that "Trade with Japan is of growing importance and these are not want signs that it may ultimately become of the first importance to Canada."

Mr. Langley has been stationed at Kobe, Japan, for several years. He left there on November 1st, landed in Vancouver on the 13th, and after spending a short time in Ottawa left for the east visiting the different centres in order to familiarize himself with conditions in Canada, and the progress which is being made in the various industries. His present tour is in accordance with the practice of his department in bringing back Trade Commissioners from the various countries at stated intervals to make, as it were, an industrial survey.

Mr. Langley arrived in Charlottetown on Friday evening, and while here met members of the Board of Trade and visited one of the fox ranches owned by Mr. W. K. Rogers. He also had a long interview with Mr. W. F. Tidmarsh of the Portland Packing Company, and discussed with him the export of the Japan canned crab meat, and its relation to the lobster industry. This was in order to carry up before the Fisheries Commission when it met on the Island this fall. Mr. Langley informed Mr. Tidmarsh that the Japan Canned Crab Exporters Association received a subsidy from the Government for advertising.

Mr. Langley was of the opinion that foxes would be the principal article of export from Prince Edward Island to Japan at the present time. Before he had left the country he had been receiving inquiries about the methods being used in Prince Edward Island. On his return he proposes a visit to the ranches in the northern part of Japan.

In discussing trade matters in general, Mr. Langley said that Canada and Japan have built up a very important trade with one another. He found in that country a friendly feeling towards Great Britain and Canada and Japan gives Canada the benefit of the most favoured nations treaties. The trade between the two countries is growing steadily and rapidly which is shown by the fact that during 1926 Canadian exports to Japan increased by approximately nineteen million dollars over the previous year. While Japan's trade with Canada had increased by four million dollars, Canada sells to Japan about three times as much as she buys. Canada receives goods that do not enter into competition with home products, silks, oranges and chinaware for instance, and she sells commodities from her great store of raw materials, wheat, pulp, zinc and lead, asbestos, and a considerable quantity of foodstuffs. Canada is the largest consumer of Japan oranges in the world.

The great bulk of the trade between Canada and Japan passes in and out of the port of Vancouver

and as a natural result of this expansion, Japanese shipping across the Pacific is increasing steadily. Last year 158 vessels entered that port, more than ever before in a single twelve month. In touching on the food problem of the Far East, Mr. Langley thought that this question was the principal one with which Japan had to deal.

The population of Japan has doubled during the last forty years, is increasing at the rate of around seven or eight hundred thousand a year, while the productive capacity of the arable land is no longer sufficient to provide sustenance for the people. The solution of the problem seems to lie in the larger purchase of foodstuffs abroad, and therefore a potential market for Canadian produce.

Speaking of the financial panic which occurred last April, Mr. Langley said that while it was quite serious for a time the authorities stepped in and rendered the necessary assistance to the various larger banks, as a result of which they were able to weather the storm. When he left Japan conditions were not by any means back to normal, but a steady re-adjustment was going on, and the third or fourth month of the New Year should find things back more or less to normal.

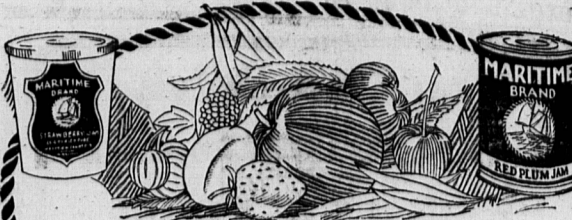

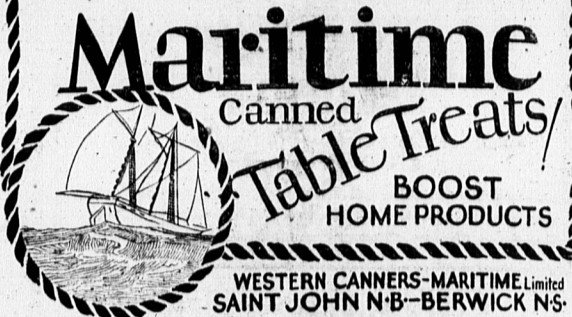
