GREAT MEETING OF SCIENTISTS PLANNED.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 22—Scientists all over the United States and in fact all over the world, are looking forward with interest to the annual meeting to be held here next week by the American Association for the Advancement of Science and its affiliated societies. Nearly all of the halls in the capital will be used to accommodate the sessions of the general association and the meetings of the affiliated societies, of which there are thirty in all.

Professor Charles E. Bessey, of the University of Nebraska, is president of the association and will preside over the general sessions. Other distinguished educators and scientists who will participate in the proceedings are Prof. Harvey W. Wiley of Washington, President David Starr Jordan of Leland Stanford University, Prof. Irving Fisher of Yale University, Prof. G. W. Bissell of Michigan Agricultural College, Prof. J. M. Keen Cattell of Columbia University, Prof. Frederick C. Newcombe of the University of Michigan, and L. O. Howard of the Smithsonian Institution.

MEAT PACKERS FIRST LITIGATION NOW OVER

CHICAGO, December 22—Counsel for the ten Chicago meat packers charged with conspiring to control the price of meats in violation of the criminal sections of the Sherman law, concluded their opening statements to the jury today and United States District Judge Geo. A. Carpenter adjourned court until next Tuesday morning. At that time the first witness for the government will take the stand.

The government will present its case in chronological order. The first witness will tell the story of the old packers' pool, which it is charged was in existence prior to the organization of the National Packing Company in 1902 and which held weekly meetings, at which the government charges prices were fixed. Later conditions which led to the formation of the National Packing Company then will be detailed and in concluding its case the government will endeavor to prove that the National Packing company was the instrument the packers used to continue the old pooling arrangements.

Three hundred witnesses will be called by the government and it is believed it will take several months to present its testimony. In addition to this a mass of documentary evidence will be offered by the prosecution.

The jury will be closely guarded during the adjournment of court and the twelve men, all of whom are married, will be obliged to eat their Christmas dinners at a downtown hotel.

FORBIDDEN TO TRAVEL IN ENGLAND

LONDON, December 22—The kaiser, acting in his capacity as commander-in-chief of the German army, has forbidden all his officers to visit England without permission from the military authorities. At present German officers must obtain the consent of the authorities to travel abroad, but they have not been required to state their destination.

The kaiser's new decree is intended to prevent German officers from undertaking at their own risk, espionage on British territory. Hitherto this has been a common practice among the ambitious young military men, who desired to gain distinction by bringing home useful information about England's defenses. This new order, however, does not mean that German officers will cease to visit England as agents of the intelligence department, but they will resign their commissions during the period of such activity, so that if they are arrested they may be described as mere civilians.

TEXT OF PAPAL DECREE.

DUBLIN, December 22.—The Express prints what purports to be the English text of the recent papal decree concerning prosecution of the clergy.

It says whenever private individuals, whether laymen or clergymen, summon ecclesiastical in civil or criminal cases without ecclesiastical permission, they will incur recommunication at the hands of the Pope.

"H. H. AORN, manager of the Klondyke Lumber Mills, Souris, who has just returned from a business trip to the Magdalen Islands, reports that with the exception of coal, of which there is a shortage of several hundred tons, the people of the Island are well supplied for the coming winter. The fuel shortage, however, is being relieved, to a great extent, by the large quantities of spoolwood which has come ashore on the various beaches. It will be remembered that the ship Antique, loaded with spoolwood, went ashore at St. Martins on the St. Lawrence, during a heavy gale, in November last, with the loss of nearly all her cargo. Twelve days after this wreck the cargo began to come ashore at the Magdalens, and it is estimated already that 500 cords have been saved, many of the fishermen having secured as much as 25 cords."

LOOKS BAD FOR THE PARAGUAYAN CITY.

PARIS, Dec. 22—The French foreign office is unable to obtain replies to cablegrams addressed to M. Belin, the French minister resident at Asuncion, the capital of Paraguay. It is thought at the foreign office that the Paraguayan city, which has a population of about 50,000, has been surrounded by victorious Paraguayan insurgents. The revolutionary movement was started about a month ago.

TAYLOR WANTS HIS GOVT JOB GUARANTEE.

MONTREAL, December 22—If Fred Taylor, the bald-headed Renfrew cyclist, wants to go to New Glasgow to play hockey this winter there is only one bar in the way, and that is that he will be permanently disqualified so far as the National Hockey Association is concerned. Taylor was drawn by the Montreal Wanderers in the Renfrew deal.

Ottawa doesn't want him particularly, but Taylor wants his civil service position at Ottawa guaranteed, or he furnished with a ten thousand dollar bond. Under the present troubled state of government positions the Wanderers management are doing what they can to secure the hockey star's position, but there will be no ten thousand dollar bond. He has not signed his Wanderer contract yet.

Harry Scott, of Fort William, who starred for Moncton last year and who will play with New Glasgow this season, has been after Taylor's services and also tried to sign Marty Walsh, who is a hold-out on Ottawa. Scott had a talk with Taylor, in which the cyclist intimated that it didn't matter where he played as long as he got the price he wanted for it. Scott asked him if he would consider an offer from the New Glasgow team, and Taylor replied in the affirmative. "It will have to be \$1500 though," said the former Renfrew star. Scott thinks that his team would give that sum to land the "Cyclone," and is awaiting instructions from the Nova Scotia team. It is said that Moncton offered to give Taylor \$1300 for the season. Scott also talked to Horace Gaul and Joe Dennison and the latter is likely to go to New Glasgow.

TWO OF THE CREW LOST FROM VESSEL

YARMOUTH, December 22—The Digby fishing schooner Lorán B. Snow, Captain Howard Seely, arrived in port this morning about eight o'clock with her flag at half-mast and reports the loss of two of his crew, John McQuinn and Charles Grant, both belonging to Digby. The two men left their vessel in a dory on Wednesday night while fishing off the lightsight Lurcher, when a heavy snow squall came up and they were lost sight of. Captain Seely looked for the two unfortunate men for some time, but no trace of them could be seen.

Captain Seely is meeting with hard luck. This is the same vessel that arrived in port some weeks ago with the loss of sails and mainmast. She was repaired at Shelburne and this is the first trip since repairs were completed. The Snow has about 35,000 pounds of mixed fish on board.
