Below will be found a brief synopsis of telegraphic reports received at the Head Office of the Bank of Montreal from its Branches.

GENERAL

In the Prairie Provinces, further damage has been done to grain crops over large areas, particularly in southern and central Saskatchewan and Manitoba.

PRAIRIE PROVINCES

Alberta Northeastern Area—An average yield is expected on summer-fallow. Stubble-crops and coarse grains are poor.

PROVINCE OF QUEBEC

Oats have benefited through recent rains and prospects for an average crop have improved. Other cereals are doing well and an average yield is expected.

PROVINCE OF ONTARIO

Harvesting of fall wheat is nearing completion and threshing returns indicate a slightly under average yield of good quality.

PROVINCE OF BRITISH COLUMBIA

Grains are in good condition and average crops are indicated. Hay and second alfalfa are still being cut.

Little Change In Mining Market

(Canadian Press) TORONTO, Aug 14.—Trading dwindled to half a million shares on the standard mining market today and prices were inclined to sag though losses among the leaders were mostly cleared off in a last half-hour recovery.

Base metal and silver shares were down a little at the close. Nickel finished 30 cents off at 19.95, Noranda 60 cents lower at \$34, while Hudson Bay lost 15, Falconbridge 11, Base Metals Corporation 9 and Coast Copper 75. Waite Ackerman gained 10 to 2.40.

Prices three points lower, quotations in pence: American middling fair 6.82; strict good middling 6.37; good middling 6.07; strict middling 5.77; middling 5.62; short low middling 5.47; low middling 5.27; strict good ordinary 5.07; good ordinary 4.77. Futures opened quiet and steady and closed firm.

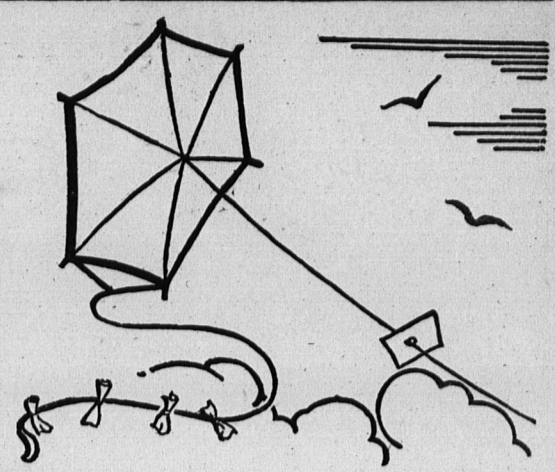
