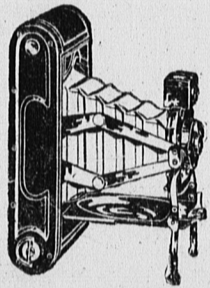

Mr. Irvine and Mrs. Montgomery were exceedingly well rendered and were very impressive as was the male quartette by Messrs Johnstone, McLeod, McKay and McLeod. Mr. Irvine's sermon from the text: "For their sakes, I sanctify myself," was a soul stirring message to the living and an eloquent tribute of honor to the departed hero who in his supreme sacrifice had followed in the footsteps of the One who laid down his life for all. A deep feeling of sympathy pervaded the whole discourse and its effects could be noticed in the large audience that listened while tears welled to the eyes of nearly all. In all, the service was the most impressive and appropriate the writer ever attended and it is sincerely hoped that it brought some comfort to the grief stricken hearts of the bereaved mother and family.
