MONTREAL, Dec. 5.—(CP)—Receipts were light and all classes were in demand at good prices on the Montreal livestock exchange today. The Dominion Department of Agriculture reported. There were 158 cattle, 26 sheep and lambs, 631 hogs and 162 calves for sale. The few cattle offered were mostly of common to just fair quality. Cows and bulls. Medium quality cows made \$4.25 to \$4.75 and common butchers \$3.50 to \$4.25. Calves and cutters were \$2.75 to \$3.25 and veal calves \$3.50 to \$4.25. Veals ranged from \$8 to \$11. good veals brought \$11 with medium kinds from \$10 to \$10.50. Drinkers were \$6 to \$8 and grassers were mostly \$5. Good ewes and wethers were \$10. Culls and bucks \$8. Sheep were \$3.50 to \$5.50. Bacon hogs were \$9.25 fed and watered and \$9.35 off trucks. Selects drew \$1 per hog premium with the regular cuts on off grades. Sows were \$6 to \$6.75 with an odd one at \$7. Hogs sold on rail grade brought \$12.30 hot weight.

GRAIN

CHICAGO, Dec. 5.—(AP)—Wheat sold at \$1 a bushel in the Chicago spot market today for the first time since March 3 1938. Dollar wheat in the market where actual grain is bought and sold accompanied the sharpest upturn of futures prices here and at other world markets since the September war boom. Wheat futures here closed 2 1/2-3 1/4 cents higher. Dec 95 3-4-96, May 92 1-2-3-4; Corn 3-4-1-2-5-8; Oats 1-2-3-4 up. WINNIPEG, Dec. 5.—(CP)—Healthy buying prompted by reports of frost damage to the new Argentine wheat crop combined with light offerings to bring excellent gains to wheat futures prices on Winnipeg grain exchange today. Operations set a brisk pace and the close quotations were 2 3/4-3 cents higher, Dec 79, May 83 3-8. Buenos Aires wheat added 2 1/2-2 7/8 cents.
