BOXERS LOOTING

CHRISTIANS BESIEGED

U. S. And Russia Unite On Plan Which British Papers Oppose.

BOXERS LOOTING AND SLAYING.

LONDON Aug. 31.—(Special).—Taku advices show that the Boxers are ever running the country south west of Tien Tsin, looting and killing all who oppose them. CHINESE TROOPS SLAUGHTER BOXERS.

At Hang Chow two thousand Boxers were invited to a feast and while they ate the Imperial troops by orders of Tootai slaughtered them.

CHRISTIANS BESIEGED BY BOXERS.

A company of Chinese Catholics have been holding a town near Pao Ting Fu against the Boxers for three months, although large sums have been offered for their capture.

AN ANTI-BRITISH COMBINE.

All the London papers severely criticize the American—Russian accord to secure the prompt evacuation of Peking as antagonistic to British interests.

The papers think Britain should oppose to the utmost the idea of the evacuation of Peking, in which course it will be supported by Emperor William of Germany.
