The Fredericton hockey team which has been on a barnstorming tour of Boston and Providence under the name of the Fredericton Millionaires returned home on Monday.

All the players were in the best of condition but Hymie McArthur who has a lame leg resulting from being board checked at Providence. The boys all left a good welcome in the Bean City but somehow or other a rumor started in Boston that left a bad flavor in the mouths of the officials of the New England Association of the American Amateur Athletic Union.

The rumor which started in Boston resulted from Fredericton losing their third game to the Boston Hockey Club 6-5 after this game Johnnie Garrison, Johnny Chase and Ding Palmer, all American Olympic hockey stars resigned from the Boston team claiming that Fredericton "threw" the game for the purpose of money gain in another game which was announced to be played if the Boston club should win. This announcement came in the second period of the game with Boston raling in scores. A. G. Smith, coach of the Boston team also resigned his position. Then on top of this trouble Charlie Cunningham and Gaswell McGregor refused to play with the Boston Club against the Fredericton team.

Bank Branches

OTTAWA, Ont., March 22—Closing of certain branches by Canadian banks was the subject of a question in the House of Commons this afternoon by G. G. Coote, (U. F. A., MacLeod).

"I have received a number of communications arising out of the closing of branches of banks", Minister of Finance E. N. Rhodes answered. "The Hon. members will appreciate the fact that the question of location or of the closing of bank branches is not a matter within the purview of the Department of Finance; it is solely a question of administration for the banks themselves. In each instance where I have received a communication I have sent it on to the banks concerned."

Mr. Coote said he received a protest against the closing of a branch of the Royal Bank of Canada at Cowley, Alta. A number of branches had been closed by different banks, said Mr. Coote; and he wanted to know if some arrangements could not be made to keep these branches open for the convenience of the public.

Beauharnois

OTTAWA, Ont., March 22—(By the Canadian Press)—The question of guarantees given to banks in connection with the Beauharnois enterprise was raised in the House of Commons this afternoon by W. D. Euler (Lib., North Waterloo). Euler stated, "I have asked the Prime Minister within the last two or three weeks whether he could give the House information with regard to any guarantees given the banks with respect to the work at Beauharnois. I do not intend to press the matter unduly but it is becoming of very considerable importance to the public; bonds and stocks of the company are going down and the press is asking for some explanation. If it were possible for the Prime Minister to give

an explanation I think it would be desirable." "I regret that I am not in a position to give the hon. gentleman the information he asks for," Prime Minister R. B. Bennett replied.
