movement, and they intend to give it their support, and will be responsible for giving the treatment in the school clinics.

"Two doctors will be assigned to each school and will be assisted by the Red Cross nurses. The toxoid is given in three small injections three weeks apart, and although immunity does not come till the end of four months following the treatment it lasts for a life-time. No children will be inoculated over fifteen years of age as very few children over that age are susceptible to diphtheria. Forms are being prepared to be distributed to the school children next week. The children will take the forms home for their parents signature and then return them to the school. At the Red Cross office clinics will be conducted that pre-school children and infants may be immunized. It is of greatest importance that the young children should receive the toxoid treatment as fifty per cent of all deaths from diphtheria occur in children under six years of age. The administration of toxoid is not an experiment, as treatment has been given to hundreds of thousands of children throughout Canada and United States, and can be given to infants without any irritating results.

nine other vessels of the Bonavista fleet, left here two weeks ago. Captain Rogers was suffering from injuries, but the crew were all well. They had run short of water but the food supplies on board were ample. Two lifeboats were smashed in attempts to rescue the Jennie Blackwood's crew. The steamer Lord Antrim was at the scene when the Nova Scotia arrived, and a boat from the former steamer was broken while being lowered. The Lord Antrim then went to the windward side of the Blackwood, and with the shelter of the other steamer the Nova Scotia lifeboat managed to reach the schooner. There was a perilous moment when the vessel's main boom crashed upon the small boat, but no one was injured and all the men were safely transferred. The lifeboat had to be abandoned. The Nova Scotia passed a submerged wreck believed to be the abandoned schooner George K., another of the Bonavista fleet. Six of the ten vessels comprising this fleet have been abandoned and their crews rescued; one returned safely, another was towed in and the Lloyd Jack and Neptune are still missing.
