PROCEEDINGS IN LEGISLATURE

(Continued from Page One.)

pass, and estimate the benefits or otherwise which they would receive thereby. When this report had been prepared a copy would be sent to the petitioners through one of their number, and on a day stated a meeting of all in the area affected would be held, at which the engineer would be present, and his report would be discussed and determined upon. A majority of the meeting must approve of the plan. If they approve, and if an appeal to the County Court has been taken, and disposed of, then the whole matter would come before the Government. The cost of the drainage would be a charge on the land to be benefited and would bear interest. The intention was that no loss should ultimately fall on the province, and that in the end the scheme would be self-sustaining. In the event of the drainage certain loans may be made on land up to a minimum supposed to represent the cost of the tiles required for drainage work. The loan was not supposed to extend beyond that. For the purpose of providing funds to supply the drainage, debentures would be issued. The interest on the loans would be as near as possible what would be required to cover the debentures, and repayment would be arranged in such a manner as that when the loans were all paid the debentures would be all paid. The Act was intended to supply credit and means to those who desired to do the work of drainage. The Government would supply free the expert services of a drainage engineer. There would be no ultimate burden on the people by this scheme, and the period of repayment of the loan would be arranged in such a manner as would most successfully carry out the objects of the Act.

Mr BELL wanted to know whether the charge on the land would take priority of mortgages and judgments. The PREMIER said the charge would have the same priority as Government taxes. When the House went into Committee on the resolution, with Mr A. P. Prowse in the chair, Mr Bell again raised the point and:

The PREMIER said the charge as a Crown debt would take priority over all other charges. But as the land would be improved by drainage, the value of the mortgage would have the value of its security enhanced. He asked if Mr Bell could suggest any other method.

Mr BELL said he was not prepared to do so, but thought the mortgagee or the judgment creditor should be advised of any such loan.

The PREMIER said there would be little to be gained by giving the money lender information of a proposal to form a drainage area, as it would only lead to additional expense, and could have no advantage, unless Mr Bell proposed that the mortgagee would have the power to oppose such a scheme being proceeded with. That then would mean that the money-lenders, by being obdurate, might hold up the drainage of a whole district. Unless they were prepared to give the money-lender power to resist, what benefit was to be obtained by giving him notice of any proposed drainage scheme.

At six o'clock the committee rose, after having reported progress, and the House having resumed, adjourned till eight o'clock.

FIRST X-RAY VICTIM OF WAR

PARIS April 11.—The first X-ray victim of the war is Prof. Theodor Guilloz of the faculty of the University of Nancy, who was decorated by the Carnegie Foundation for humanitarian services. Prof. Guilloz established seven X-ray stations at Nancy for treatment of wounded, while caring for prisoners he contracted radiorhinitis, which proved fatal.

RAILWAY BILL IN COMMONS

(From Our Own Correspondent.)

OTTAWA, April 11.—The House today, after giving it the second reading, reported from Committee Hon. J. D. Reid's bill to alter the Railway Act and this measure now stands for the third reading. The bill empowers the Railway Commission to pass upon the general locations of new railways and to refuse construction of railways if they are not thought to be in the public interest.

Some objection was taken by Hon. Geo. P. Graham and by some members on the government side of the House to the relation of the powers formerly exercised by the rail committee of parliament to the railway commission but the acting Minister of Railways asked that the experiment be given a trial. The new clauses have been taken from the consolidated and amendment railway act introduced two sessions ago but not proceeded with since the war.

Mr. G. E. McCreaney during the discussion protested strongly against the lobbying of members by applicants for railway charters and said it was because the Railway Committee had listened to such lobbying in the past that parliament had now lost confidence there.

LONDON, April 11.—Five child performers were burned to death on the stage of the Garrick Theatre at Hereford Friday night. It was a children's entertainment to provide for comforts for the soldier. The curtain fell on the final scene and the audience was departing when the cry of fire was raised. A panic ensued. Many in the audience were crushed, but none seriously injured. The fire was confined to the stage where the performers were wearing dresses covered with cotton wool for a snow scene. The flames spread furiously and the children ran frantically about the stage with their garments on fire.
