Princess Mary Choosing Her Trousseau

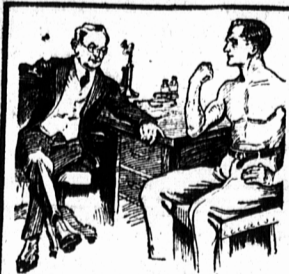
Stipulates That All Material Must be of British Make and All Work Done by Soldiers' W. Idows and Dependents.

Japan Sends New Tonnage Estimates

G. Walton and Co. shoe factory in Chelsea Mass., last Saturday. Petkewicz turned over to the two citizens \$5,000 in cash which he said was his share of the loot obtained in the holdup. In surrendering the money Petkewicz said he thought the two men followed him from Boston.

FRENCH-ACADIAN SOCIETY FORMED

Rev. A. D. Cormier, Shediac; Senator Bourque, Richibucto; Rev. Fr. Breaud, president of the St. Ann's College, Church Point, N. S.; Rev. Louis Guerin, president of St. Joseph's; Rev. Fr. Veillard, president of the Bathurst College; Rev. P. P. Arsenault, P. E. Island; Prof. Gautreaux of Antigonish; Fred Robidoux of Shediac, together with several local French-Canadians, including Rev. H. D. Cormier, Father LeBlanc, Dr. F. A. Richard, A. J. Leger, Dr. A. R. Landry and others, met here on Thursday for the purpose of forming a Franco-Canadian Society whose aims are to name a candidate every two years for a scholarship offered by the government of France for post graduate work in Science. The scholarship will apply to French Acadicians only and comprise a two years' course free with all expenses and every opportunity for perfecting the candidate in any one of the above branches. It is along similar lines to the Rhodes scholarship, the purpose being in this case to inculcate French science in its different branches amongst the Acadian people of the Maritime Provinces and the Magdalen Islands.

Franco-Turk Treaty Causes British Some Concern

French Have Dealt Severe Blow to Allied Solidarity

LONDON, Nov. 29.—Answering the French note on the subject of the treaty recently by France with the Turkish Nationalist Government at Angora, to which Britain has taken exception in some particulars, a British note was handed Friday to the French Ambassador here reiterating, it is understood, the British expression of desire for a further explanation of the terms and purposes of the separate pact made by France with the Government of Mustapha Kemal Pasha.

The British position is that the French, aside from dealing a severe blow to Allied solidarity by negotiating the Angora treaty, have caused the Turks to assume a highly uncompromising attitude which is likely to render extremely difficult any mediation with the Greeks on moderate terms.

PULLMAN ART WORKS UNDER THE HAMMER

CHICAGO, Ill., Nov. 28.—During the first three days of next week the famous art works collected during many years by George H. Pullman, and largely increased by his widow, will go under the auctioneer's hammer at the splendid Prairie avenue residence. The sale will include all the personal property not willed in special bequests at the time of Mrs. Pullman's death, except jewels and automobiles. It is estimated that the carved tables, chairs, inlaid furniture, French miniatures and pottery are worth in excess of \$50,000. Most of the valuable paintings were disposed of in Mrs. Pullman's will.

Mr. Myers and Mrs. Myers' friends hope that the protracted stay in the east with the change of scenery and climate, will be of benefit to Mrs. Myers' health, which has been uncertain for some time. Mrs. Alice Myers will go from Winnipeg to Toronto, where she will visit her uncle, Rev. C. A. Myers, for a week or so, and then continue her journey to Hartford, Connecticut, where she will make her home for some time with another uncle, Dr. A. J. W. Myers, and will continue her study of music. Mrs. Myers and her daughter will both be very much missed in Naramata, where they both took a leading part in church and other societies of the place, and had a host of friends.

ANXIETY OVER IRISH SOLUTION

LONDON, Nov. 29.—Today was one of anxious waiting in Britain and Ireland for the next move in the Irish peace negotiations with the hope still prevailing that after five months of true and prolonged conferences over the problem some way would be found out of the present apparent impasse.

So far as the next definite statement likely to reach the public will come tomorrow at noon from Belfast when Sir James Craig, Ulster Premier, will read to the North Ireland Parliament the statement agreed upon between him and Premier Lloyd George, giving cause of failure in negotiations between himself and the British Prime Minister for establishment of an all Ireland parliament.
