ALL NEWS OF LOCAL INTEREST

The House is expected to prorogue tomorrow.

The sincere sympathy of many friends will go out to Joseph W. and Mrs. Wright nee Miss Nina Lowther of North Carleton in the death of their little son, Frank, aged 10 months. He died at his parents' home Jamaica Plain, Mass. after only three hours suffering.

The remains of the late D. K. Dobie arrived last night by the Princess from Halifax. The boat was met by a large number of people including the Foresters and the funeral cortege bore testimony to the esteem in which the deceased was held in the city. TEE RELIANCE ON HER TRIAL SPIN

The Defender of the America Cup Proves Satisfactory

Makes an Excellent Run Before Light Breezes. Shows all Characteristics of Moving Fast in Light Breezes.

QUAKER HILL, Portsmouth, R. I. April 26.—The Reliance started on her trial trip at 1:35 o'clock this morning, in a very light westerly breeze. She swung away from her moorings under three lower sails and working topsail. Designer Herreshoff was at the wheel and accompanying the yacht down the harbor from Bristol were the yacht tenders Sunbeam and Park City, the steam yacht Corona, with Commodore Burne on board, and the press tug.
As soon as the crew returned from a hearty breakfast they all sallied onto the halcyards of the mainsail and by 8:20 the great sail was masted for the first time. But Captain Barr did not like the set of it exactly, so it was lowered and the foot hauled out a bit on the boom.
The mainsail was again hauled up, the crew working like beavers to get it taut on the luff. The part of the sail set 'aily well', but the leach flapped badly, SEEMED RATHER STIFF.

In the meantime Commodore Burne came into the harbor from New York on his old flagship, the Corona, and dropped anchor a few hundred yards ahead of the Reliance. The commodore paid a short visit to Mr. Smith on board the Sunbeam, but returned to the Corona about 9:15. At this time the sky was completely overcast, while over in the west a little rain squall was in evidence. The wind held from the northwest, however, although it decreased to scarcely three miles an hour.
At 9:30 Mr. Leelin, with his executive committee of amateur yachtsmen, Captain Woodbury Kane, Lieutenant W. Butler Duncan, Jr., and Mr. Newbery Thorne, went on board the Reliance and preparations were at once begun towards getting under way. A working topsail was set and at 9:38 the jib was broken out, and the Reliance swung away on the starboard tack with her designer, Not Herreshoff, at the wheel. The wheel was so light that it was fully a minute before the yacht swung round and headed down the harbor towards Hog Island light. The staysail was soon broken out and later a jibtop sail was also set but it was the tide alone that carried her out of the harbor.
The Reliance seemed rather stiff, for, notwithstanding the heavy mainsail, boom and gaff swung well off on the port side, she had scarcely any heel.

FAST IN LIGHT BREEZE.

The Reliance was an hour getting out of the harbor, and while she was drifting along the crew changed the working topsail for a very small club-topsail. The slackening of the mainsail along the leach was due to a considerable extent to the absence of battens, others of the big yachts carrying three or four. Still, the Reliance's sail was badly puckered along the foot, and today it looked as if it would have to be altered to some extent.

Her head sails were somewhat better, although the jib was slack on the luff.
At 10:40 the wind strengthened a bit, and chiming in her sheet the Reliance headed out into Narragansett bay. As the breeze freshened the boat began to gather headway and slipped along through the water quite swiftly. It was a little beat down to Prudence Island, so a half a dozen short hitches were made. In the light air the Reliance tacked inside of 20 seconds with ease, and gathered headway very quickly. She had all of the Herreshoff characteristics of moving fast in very light breezes.
