MRS. LOUIS HAGAN

Her many friends in Kelly's Cross, and in many other districts throughout the Island, were saddened and shocked to hear of the sudden and untimely death of Mrs. Louis Hagan, which took place in the City Hospital, Charlottetown, on the early morning of December 20th, 1947.

Margaret, as she was affectionately known to all her friends, was of a kind and charitable disposition, and by her friendly manner had won for herself a host of friends not only in her native district but also in her adopted parish of Kelly's Cross.

The late Mrs. Hagan, who was a daughter of St. Peter's Bay, was in her thirty-seventh year, having been born at St. Peter's Bay on July 23rd, 1911. She received her early education at St. Peter's and later attended Notre Dame Academy in Charlottetown for some time.

Also among those left to mourn their loss are her father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. Wm. K. Larkin, St. Peter's Bay; two brothers, Joseph and John Larkin of St. Peter's; and three sisters, Mary (Mrs. Wm. McQuaid) of South Melville, and Misses Cecelia and Monica of Ottawa.

The funeral was held from her home on the morning of Dec. 23rd to St. Joseph's Church, Kelly's Cross, and was very largely attended. The pastor, Rev. Wilfred Keefe, celebrated the Requiem High Mass and also recited the funeral service at the grave.

Interment took place in St. Joseph Cemetery, 'May She Rest in Peace.'

NINE PERSONS (Continued from Page 1) through bedroom windows. The Haven, a semi-charitable institution three miles west of Medicine Hat, was formerly an R.A.F. building at the municipal airport.

Damage was confined to the kitchen, dining room corridors and two or three bedrooms. Circumstances of the fire at Belleville were similar to those at Medicine Hat. Mrs. Lena Flieger, 70, and a deaf resident, Mrs. M. Ottrey, 92, were the victims. Mrs. Autry was blind. The fire was discovered about 9 P.M. by the building's supervisors, Mr. and Mrs. Archie Gilroy. Firemen who fought the blaze in 12-below-zero weather said they believed a faulty furnace caused the fire.

The home for the aged was operated by the Women's Christian Association of Belleville. In the Port Colborne tragedy, Dorothy Browne was acting as a baby-sitter for the smaller children while their parents attended a bowling party.

Mr. and Mrs. Wilfred Eden, parents of Marion Elaine, returned from a bowling party at 1:15 A.M. Sunday and found doors and windows locked. Mr. Eden broke through the back door and found Carol, who arrived from Rochester, N.Y., Saturday, for a visit on the bathroom floor, June Browne in a doorway between the bedroom and kitchen. Baby Marion Elaine was in her crib.

Fritz, the family's pet dog, was whining feebly but revived when put out in the snow. The parents roused neighbors and called doctors and firemen. Three inhalators were rushed to the house but efforts to revive the three children failed. The baby was pronounced dead at 4 A.M., the other two children at 8 A.M.

Police and firemen said the carbon monoxide had come from a hot water heater with a defective burner and fluctuating gas pressure. No inquest will be held and no postmortem performed.
