A DISCOURSE ON "WATCH AND PRAY"

(Continued from page 1.)

was, as we thought, no need for being on our guard. The devil is always on the alert—Satan is always on the lookout for souls. St. Peter has said: Your adversary the devil is a roaring lion, walking about seeking whom he may devour. And if anyone can speak with authority on this particular subject, surely it was St. Peter. It was in an unguarded moment that St. Peter's terrible fall came? When he faced the servants and soldiers of the High Priest he was his guard, and was braver than enough. Then later he mixed with the soldiers, and when they made a fire we are told that Peter stood also and warmed himself—he was getting more or less on friendly terms with them, not thinking for a moment of the temptation of which he had been warned. Then came his fall, when he was thinking not at all of any such temptation.

So it is with us. Perhaps some of us have been trying this Lent to wrestle with our besetting sin; we have advanced so much, and we feel we have overcome that fault; and then it is, when we are on our guard, that the temptation comes upon us, and before we realize we have fallen under it. Let him that thinketh he standeth take heed lest he fall. "Watch," St. Paul says to Timothy: "Watch thou in all things." We might multiply the instances where we are warned by Christ to watch. Let us think of our words of conversation. The psalmist speaks of the words that do hurt. "The tongue is an unruly member." Again, the psalmist has said he set a watch upon his lips: "I kept my mouth as it were with a bridle." Why? Because it may be that words spoken in a flippancy way have caused a weak brother, for whom Christ died, to stumble. Perhaps we have spoken lightly of the holy scripture, and those who have listened have thought: After all he is not very particularly convinced himself; why should I be? Many a time some poor sorrowing soul has been wounded by our remarks, just because we have not kept watch upon the door of our lips. Then we say: Oh, I didn't mean it; I feel sorry for it. Yet nothing can ever recall those words we have spoken. It is because the spirit is willing but the flesh is weak; we had no intention of saying what would hurt, but it has been done, and thoughtlessly—because we were not watching. Many instances will readily occur to our minds, and how many mistakes we have made through not taking heed of our words. The need is to watch. "Watch and pray, that ye enter not into temptation."

Watch and prayer. Think of our blessed Lord Jesus Christ's life—an example which all of us profess, at any rate, to follow—how he declared himself to be the Light of the world, and even He must keep that light burning by constant communion with the Father. Think how our blessed Lord, because He was tempted, felt His need of prayer. His life, as we know, was the busiest life imaginable, but he always found time for prayer—for communion with God. We are told that He sometimes spent all night in prayer with God; that on one occasion He rose up a great while before day in order that he might have communion with His Father. Again, in the Garden of Gethsemane, He prayed so earnestly that sweat like great drops of blood fell to the ground.

My friends, let us ask ourselves, in the face of this, what we individually know of prayer. We come here tonight to God's House, which is the House of prayer. The angels have been present here during our worship. May we not ask ourselves, what prayer have the angels taken from me tonight up to the throne of grace? Have I earnestly joined in the prayers here in God's House tonight? Has my heart been lifted up? Do I realize that I am a sinner pleading at the steps of the throne of grace?

How formal our prayers are! We all acknowledge that our private prayers are wanting in faith, wanting in earnestness. We know we cannot exactly say of ourselves, "We come to thee Dear Saviour just because we need thee so." We would not leave our private prayers out, because of a child at our mother's knee, we have been taught to say them, and so we come to speak of cause from a child, on mothers' knee, we have been taught to say our prayers, and so we come to speak of it as "saying our prayers," as some duty that must be performed in the morning and evening, and possibly at mid-day. But are we earnest in our prayers? Are we praying for spiritual gifts? Are we praying that God will provide, in His goodness, for our bodily wants—give us day by day our daily bread?—and are we also praying for those spiritual gifts which indeed are far higher, far better, because man does not live by bread alone, but by every word which proceedeth out of the mouth of God.

And then it may be that our prayers are selfish. I have heard people say that they only pray when some member of the family—some one near and dear to them—is dangerously ill; or at times pray for something which they feel they need most urgently. How often do we pray for others? You know how Christ bid us give regard to others—"Pray ye for those who despitefully use you." How much of our time is spent in praying for them?

But God is above all. The Blessed Saviour, with his arms stretched far over this sinful, selfish world today, is pleading to men to seek more earnestly those things which are above. "Watch—as if in that long hour the issue of the day. Pray that help may be sent down; watch and pray.
