REV. DR. BURKE IS PRESIDENT

Public Spirited Prince Edward Island Clergyman Given a Very Important Position -- Dr. Burke Speaks of the Recent Meeting of the Maritime Board of Trade.

HALIFAX, Sept. 1.—The Rev. Dr. Burke, of Prince Edward Island, familiarly known as "the father of the tunnel," has recently returned from an extended tour through the United States and Canada. He has been appointed to the presidency of the first National Missionary society in his church and will have to devote much of his time and about all of his splendid powers of organization to the mammoth work which comprehends the securing of churches and the necessities of public worship to pioneer and poverty-stricken districts the distribution of Catholic literature; the establishment of a college for the education and training of missionary priests and all else that the extension of the church postulates in unorganized districts of the Middle West, Northwest and West of Canada. All this will be brought about by the individual support of those well disposed, through the cultivation of the missionary spirit in clergy and laity alike. "Prudent, far-seeing, loyal Catholics," said Dr. Burke, "in the clergy and laity have come to the conclusion that the time is ripe for the establishment of such an organization in the Catholic church—you have it long since in the other churches—and the burden has been imposed on my poor shoulders. With the reasonable support we may expect, and a board of governors composed of Mgr. Sbarretti, the apostolic delegate; Mgr. McEvoy, Archbishop of Toronto; Mgr. Begin, Archbishop of Quebec; Bishop McDonald, of Charlottetown; Rt. Hon. Sir Charles Fitzpatrick, Hon. Alex. Taschereau and Judge Bask, of Edmonton, etc., we may hope, without any taint of presumption, for a reasonable measure of success from the outset. I am visiting the bishops at the moment, and securing their sympathy which goes out whole-souled to such a project. The laity will be appealed to in due season."

Dr. Burke spoke approvingly of the late maritime board meeting here, which, he said, he regretted to have missed, and which he understood was admirably conducted and eminently successful. "Those meetings have done much for these poor maritime provinces," said Dr. Burke, "and they will do still more in the future. They constitute an impartial military council and the men who attend them are genuine patriots for the most part. I was glad to see the constancy on the board on the tunnel. Nothing else can ever satisfy Prince Edward Island and the unification of the maritime provinces on this head alone will advance the hour of its coming greatly. We have got to be true to ourselves in these sea divisions, seek compensatory advantages for the inequalities the confederation with even the best intentions necessarily imposes, and stand together in the getting of them against the unrepresentative of other considerable portions of the country. These mainland provinces depend more on the island's prosperity than is generally admitted—the three provinces as complements of each other. We expect loyal support to remove our disabilities as a province and we will lend support gladly to you in the movements necessary for your upbuilding and prosperity."

We asked the reverend doctor if the tunnel were any nearer. "Certainly," he said with a knowing wink, "if it's coming at all, and it's got to come proximately." He adverted to Hon. Geo. Foster's speech in which he told the islanders this week that it was a simple proposition and well within the immediate purview of practical politics, and said that undoubtedly the liberal leaders would be holding out the same hopes next week in their island discourses. "If we had members enough to make it worth the while to the politicians," he said, "long ago would we be in the life stream of the continent by means of rails under the strait. But we will get there presently—we will stop at nothing less—and although we have lost much by the delay the

tunnel will still make us the best part of Canada."

Dr. Burke says that Prince Edward Island is rejoicing in a good crop—grain is a little below the average—everything else better. The fisheries have not been quite up to the mark of other years, but there is little chance of hardship he thinks. He regrets the continued exodus. Dr. Burke hopes to be in Halifax often in the future, and to be able to note for himself the quick forward advance of the main port city.—Halifax Herald.

A TRUE BILL AGAINST BROKER

Grand Jury Acts in Charge Brought Against D. C. Clinch, of St. John.

ST. JOHN, September 2.—In the circuit court here today, Judge McLeod, presiding, the grand jury found a true bill against D. C. Clinch, banker and broker, of this city. The charge is misappropriating \$9,000 which Captain George Morrissy, of Liverpool, England, formerly of New Brunswick, says he sent to Mr. Clinch in January last to be invested in United States Steel preferred stock. He says it was not so invested. A preliminary hearing was had before Judge Ritchie here recently and the case dismissed. The complainant brings the case before the higher courts.

AN ADVENTURE OF LEGLESS GIRL

BERLIN, Sept. 2.—Some years ago a Berlin girl was found one winter morning lying in the woods near Potsdam. She had been out all the night, which had been bitterly cold, and was frozen stiff and could not move. At the hospital it was found that both her legs must be amputated. Provided by the charitable with wooden members, she learned in time to get about quickly on them.

A few days ago she made an excursion into the woods which surrounded the little town in Koenigsberg. In the course of her wanderings she came to a deep-lying brook, and felling thirsty decided to descend to it and drink. As it was difficult for her to get down the slope on her wooden legs, she unstrapped them, and, leaving them at the top of the bank, dragged herself down to the water on her hands and stumps. While she was drinking, three young men came long and noticed two strange-looking sticks lying by the path. As the girl was hidden from them by bushes they thought the things had been lost, and picking them up, walked off with them. Immediately afterwards they came in view of the owner of the legs, and she, catching sight of her property in their hands, set up a piteous cry. But the strangers either did not hear her, or did not comprehend the meaning of her shouts.

The unfortunate girl made valiant efforts to get out of the woods by crawling, but before she got into the open country her strength was exhausted, and she collapsed. For four days she lay without food or water, until she was found on the point of death by a chance passerby. Even now it is doubtful whether she will recover.
