Injury And Death Follow Collision

MOSCOW, Jan. 8.—(A.P.)—Fifty persons were killed and many others injured in a rear-end train collision Saturday about nine miles northwest of Moscow, it was learned today.

The heavy casualty list resulted in part from the fact that the injured were placed by rescuers along a parallel track to await the arrival of medical crews from Moscow.

Government and railway officials attempted to suppress all news of the disaster. So there were no official figures on the total casualties.

Two six-car local trains, both packed with passengers, were involved in the collision. One of them had halted at a switch near preparatory to taking a sidetrack along a stretch of double track.

Missing Mail Pouch Is Found

LOWELL, Mass., Jan. 8.—Two mail sacks believed by police to be two containing \$100,000 in registered mail and currency that disappeared Dec. 31st, while in transit from Lowell to Boston were found late today beside the highway between Lowell and Tewksbury.

The mail sacks were found about fifteen feet from the roadway in the bushes. Motory Wiktorwica, a farm laborer, who discovered the sacks immediately communicated with Lowell police and Captain David Pegie and Post Office Inspector Byron J. Hall took charge of the find.

Petrie said the mail pouch when it disappeared contained two sacks of mail, one containing currency and the other registered mail. He said he believed the sacks found today were those which had been in the pouch.

Petrie said the locks had been out from the sacks and the contents removed. The sacks were dry and indicated, he said, that they had been thrown into the bushes not more than two hours previous.

The money was the property of the Union-Old Lowell National Bank and was being sent to the Federal Reserve Bank in Boston.
