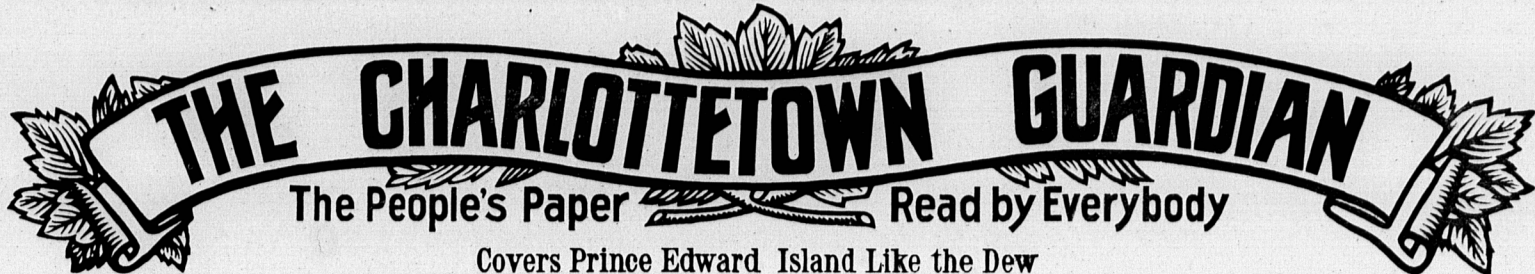

## REDS SET BALKANS AQUIVER

### Man Of Hour Determined To Hold Colony

#### Declares "To Abandon Territory Without Fighting Out Of Question."

(Canadian Press)

General Auguste Nogues, military administrator and sand-bitten soldier of the old French colonial school, is the man of the hour in French North Africa.

He has refused to give up France's fight and rallied under his command in French Morocco not only his own crack Moroccan troops, but many other Arabs.

Reports from Gibraltar indicated that he also may have powerful units of the western Mediterranean French navy in the harbor of Casablanca, recently developed Atlantic port of French Morocco and planes flown from France before the armistice.

General Nogues, commander of all French North African forces, lent support to those reports himself in a radio broadcast earlier this week when he said:—

"To abandon without fighting all or any part of the territory over which we exercise sovereignty or protectorate is out of the question.

"This Government is not willing to consent to reduction of the contingents stationed in this territory.

"For the time being the integrity of northern Africa, and its means of defence have been assured."

Husky, with hair greying at the temples and a close-clipped grey mustache, General Nogues has devoted most of his military life to the French army in the hot, sandy lands of North Africa.

He trained there, served there, rose to high command there and returned to French Morocco as Commissioner General in 1936—24 years after France assumed protectorate over the Moroccan Sultan's lands.

He has been war and civil chief—responsible only to the home government.

His record in nipping up uprisings and handling troops—how many he has now has never been disclosed, since he bolstered Moroccan defences by forming, arming and drilling a native militia—led to his higher appointment as supreme commander of French armed forces in North Africa.

**First British Children Expected Next Month**

**OTTAWA.**—June 27—(CP)—The first 3,000 British children to be brought to Canada for the duration of the war will arrive at the middle of July, Resources Minister Crear informed the Commons today.

Additional groups of 750 will arrive at five day intervals until July 25, he added. The British Government had been unable up to the present to estimate the total number likely to come but Mr. Crear felt it would reach "very large dimensions."

His conference earlier today with provincial ministers was held to consider further plans for a "greatly expanded movement," if that should become necessary.

### R. A. F. Raided 60 Cities In Nazi Areas

**LONDON, June 27**—(CP)—The Royal Air Force has raided 60 industrial cities in Germany and German-occupied territories since last Saturday, the day the German-French armistice was signed, it was announced tonight.

The announcement was made over the facilities of the British Broadcasting Corporation.

At the same time the air ministry disclosed that the air force had struck in broad daylight Wednesday and today at objectives in the Reich and the Netherlands.

In today's raid an oil refinery at Milsburg near Hannover was hit and fires were started. Other bombers attacked oil refineries at Bremen and a factory near Salzbergen. All R. A. F. planes returned safely.

Yesterday's daylight raid resulted in bombing of an oil plant at Gelsenkirchen and railway sidings at Soest. One plane was lost.

The attacks were made despite the fact that enemy fighters rose to drive off the British bombers, the Air Ministry said.

Night operations included attacks on seaplane bases at Texel and Heider and airbases at Schiphol, Waalhaven and Deekoy in Holland.

### British Warn Nazi Workers Re Air Raids

**LONDON, June 27**—(CP)—The British Broadcasting Corporation in its German broadcast told the people of Germany that British airmen are fighting Nazism, not civilians.

"Since the Nazis do not give air raid warnings, it is essential that the German people should be warned from other sources," the announcer said. "Take cover as soon as you hear the approach of British planes."

The British broadcast, as heard by Columbia Broadcasting System in New York, follows, in part:

"Two days ago you (German people) were informed by the German radio that air raid alarms will not be given in wide areas of Germany. You were also told to remain at your work until you hear the anti-aircraft guns, and only at that time are you allowed to run for shelter.

"This is not the first time that the German radio has given you that rather dangerous advice."

"We have heard that the authorities in Hamburg are facing a serious problem. Shall alarms be given or not? If no air raid signals are given when the guns start firing and the bombs begin to fall, it would mean the outbreak of panic. If on the other hand, signals are given, everybody in Hamburg would run to the air raid shelters and could have a chat there about the ineffectiveness of the anti-aircraft defences.

"When the British air force recently visited the Rhine province a steel plant was destroyed where the night shift was still working. And the result? Not only the plant was destroyed but also many workers were killed. And who is to blame for that? The building was unquestionably a military objective but did the workers get time to seek shelter?"

"You have also been told that the attacks of the Royal Air Force are made without any plan, that the attacks therefore come surprisingly and that that is the reason no alarms are given.

"You, of course, are not allowed to write each other about such things. But perhaps the people of Hamburg have heard that a big munitions plant at Hamburg was destroyed by British planes.

"And perhaps you also know that a margarine factory was destroyed... perhaps the people of Hamburg will have wondered why they were not allowed to enter the port."

"The reason is, of course, that the British pilots inflicted heavy damage."

"We shall attack only military objects with bombs. If the Nazis think war production is more important than the lives of German wives and children—you have to protect yourselves. Leave your working room and go to your air raid shelter as soon as British planes arrive."

### Ottawa Keyed Up As Cabinet Changes Awaited

**OTTAWA, June 27**—(CP)—For three days Ottawa has been keyed up with the expectation Prime Minister Mackenzie King would announce reorganization of his cabinet. Each day the galleries of the Commons have been filled at three o'clock opening but no announcement has been made.

It was thought tonight the Prime Minister might announce the cabinet changes during the long week-end when the House will not be in session. In any event the close attention Finance Minister Ralston is taking in the budget debate appeared to indicate that he is not intending to change over to the defence department until the budget debate is concluded.

Earlier it had been expected Col. Ralston would resign the finance portfolio as soon as he had delivered the budget, which he did last Monday, leaving the task of defending it to Revenue Minister Isley.

Indications now are that Col. Ralston will stay in the finance job until the budget is carried but Mr. Isley will take over the long arduous duties of steering through the Commons the resolutions to bring the tax changes into effect.

Tom Moore, President of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada has often been mentioned as likely to become Labor Minister in the reorganized cabinet, but word today was that Mr. Moore feels he can better serve Canada and particularly the labor movement by remaining in the position he presently occupies.

In that case Labor Minister MeLarty is likely to remain head of the labor department.

Earlier it was stated he would go back to the post office department which will be vacated when Postmaster General Power resigns that portfolio to give all his time to his post of Minister of National Defence for air.

### Reviews War Work Of Ford Co. Of Canada

(Special To The Guardian)

"At the outbreak of war I assured the Canadian government that Ford Motor Company of Canada, Limited, would make all its facilities available for the production of essential war supplies. We have done that. Last night I reaffirmed the Ford position in Canada in a telegram to Hon. C. D. Howe, Minister of Munitions and Supply," said Wallace R. Campbell, President of the Canadian Ford organization.

"All the facilities, resources, manpower and equipment of the Canadian Ford Company and the overseas affiliated Ford companies in Australia, New Zealand, South Africa, India and Malaya are now making, and have been making, every possible contribution to the defence of the British Empire and the successful prosecution of the war," said Mr. Campbell. ### Senate Discusses Ford Boycott; Decides Against

**OTTAWA, June 27**—(CP)—A boycott of Ford Motor products would be against the interests of the Canadian public holding a majority of the stock of the Ford Motor Company of Canada, Senator J. J. Donnelly (Con. Ontario) declared in the Senate today.

### Land Grab In Rumania Takes Area Near War

#### Soviets Thrust Hammer And Sickle Deep Into Germanic-Italo Spheres.

**BUDAPEST, June 27**—(AP)—Soviet Russia reached across the Danube and thrust the hammer and sickle deep toward the Balkan spheres of Germany and Italy today in a new map-shuffle which set southeastern Europe aquiver.

Against a background of mobilizing armies and centuries of racial and national rivalry, the question tonight was whether Hungary and Bulgaria would accept the Russian coup as a signal for a complete Rumanian break-up.

The reliable report that Hungary's Premier, Count Paul Teleki, had received a letter from Hitler promising him that Hungary's territorial aspirations "will be met" was one straw in the wind.

**MAY RESTRAIN HUNGARY**

But reports that Rumania is secretly mobilizing reserves to reinforce 1,500,000 or more men already under arms and rushing them to her western frontier may restrain Hungary at this time.

Rumania tonight cut off all telephone communication with her neighbors, veiling her moves.

These reports suggested that King Carol had made his peace with Stalin at great sacrifice in the hope of saving the big province of Transylvania from Hungary and southern Dobruja from Bulgaria.

**BUDAPEST QUIET**

There was no sign of exceptional military activity in Budapest, but Hungary was known to have large forces gathered near the frontier of Transylvania, which she lost in the First Great War.

The Hungarian Cabinet met to discuss the situation. The German and Italian ministers called upon the Hungarian Premier and Foreign Minister, but whether to give assurance of support of her claims on Rumania or to counsel restraint was not known.

The Hungarian Government radio announcement of Carol's acceptance of the Soviet demand commented:—

"Thus the integrity of the Rumanian territory, about which so many debates have been heard in the last 20 years, exists no more."

King Boris of Bulgaria presided over an extraordinary crown council meeting at his country palace outside Sofia after repeated conferences on the Balkan situation.

Officials in Bulgaria expressed doubt that any move toward Dobruja would be made until results of the Soviet action became known.

Bulgaria also has called up reservists, and Bulgarian newspapers printed long articles on Balkan territorial revision from the German and Italian press.

### Bishop J. A. O'Sullivan Addresses C.W.L.

**SAINT JOHN, N. B., June 27**—(CP)—Bishop J. A. O'Sullivan of Charlottetown, addressing the Catholic Women's League of Canada tonight, called upon Catholic women to continue assisting the church to preserve the sanctity of family life and the home.

"Twenty years ago the Catholic women received a mandate from the church that never has been recalled and today the church cherishes the highest admiration for the Catholic Women's League," he told 400 women assembled at a banquet. The League's 20th national convention will conclude tomorrow.

"For 2000 years the Catholic Church has fought for the preservation of the whole gospel of Jesus Christ, for the freedom of the individual and of the family," said Bishop O'Sullivan.

"For 2000 years she has been a builder of all that is noblest and best in human civilization, and she is today building and repairing the foundations of society which corroding influences have destroyed."

An honorary life membership was conferred upon Mrs. T. H. Hay, Regina, C. W. L. President. Officers will be elected at the final session tomorrow.
