He referred to retirement of Mr. Bonnell, assistant superintendent, a faithful servant of the institution for many years, and is now retiring owing to advancing years. In Dr. McIntosh is found a splendid superintendent. The premier referred to the Falconwood Farm, as a great asset to the institution. It is regrettable that the government cannot equip the farm with better buildings. The hospital has a splendid situation, and affords a magnificent view. If an increased subsidy comes the premier hoped that a sun would be available for public health.

HON. B. W. LEPAGE Hon. B. W. LePage stated that Falconwood Hospital is the only state institution of the government at the present time. In it the people take a great interest. The annual reports show the splendid work done at all times. The institution is fortunate in having a man of the calibre of Dr. McIntosh. Mr. Bonnell is a faithful servant of forty-six years record. Equally fine is the work of Mrs. Bonnell in the Infirmary. The attendants are also in line for congratulation. In presenting the diplomas, Mr. LePage congratulated the nurses.

ICELAND (Continued from page 1) present the voice of the people. Grim explored the island in search of a suitable meeting place while Ulfhjoer went to Norway to study law.

The First Parliament The one chose a site at Thingvellir and the other drew up a code of law, and just one thousand years ago this first Parliament met under the open sky. It has been a going concern ever since.

The main millennium festivities will take place from June 26 to 28 inclusive. The government has arranged to house many of the visitors in tents at Thingvellir, which is about 30 miles from the capital of Reykjavik. Others will be housed in the capital and the rest will sleep and live in the steamships which bring them to Iceland. On the opening day of the ceremonies the peasant farmers from all parts of Iceland will come to Thingvellir on their pack horses as did their ancestors 1000 years ago, for there are no railways on the island.

A very extensive programme has been prepared, opened by a mass assemblage of natives and visitors at what is still known as the "Law Rock." Here speeches will be made by the acting Premier and the King. Then the Althing will hold a session and an address will be made by the speaker. In the afternoon speakers representing the Icelandic Americans and Canadians will deliver speeches. On the opening day and those following there will be the singing of Icelandic cantatas by a great choir, historical plays, displays of peasant wrestling, folk dancing, mountain climbing and horse racing.

Most people think of Iceland as a tiny speck up in the frozen waters of the north Atlantic. As a matter of fact, it is 20 per cent bigger than Ireland and about the same size as the state of Kentucky. It is of volcanic origin and has a number of volcanoes, the most celebrated being Hekla, which is over a mile high and had an eruption as late as 1912. There are over 900 hot springs and geysers in Iceland. The population is about 100,000 of whom 22,000 live in Reykjavik, the capital. Only the valleys are given over to cultivation, the main industries being sheep raising and fishing.

public from 930 to 1263 when it joined Norway. The two came under Danish rule in 1381. When Norway separated from Denmark in 1814, Iceland remained under Denmark. But the Icelanders always were a stiff and independent folk and, finally, in 1918 Denmark acknowledged Iceland as a sovereign state, united with Denmark only in that the Danish King is also King of Iceland. In all else it is absolutely free, except that until 1840 Denmark has charge of its foreign relations. Though the little island state has no railways, it has an extensive system of good roads and an excellent telegraph and telephone service, schools and a university. Crime is almost unknown. Education is universal and books are widely read. In proportion to its small population, it has also contributed much to Danish art and literature.

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
