OTTAWA, Mar. 14—At the opening of the House Hon. J. D. Hazen introduced a bill to amend the fisheries act in reference to the oyster fisheries of the maritime provinces.

He pointed out that fishing in N. B. N. S. and P. E. I. were becoming depleted through abuse.

An important clause allows the governor-in-council to amend with the privilege to frame a lease of water suitable for oyster culture.

Taking the present price of produce at 38c and deducting the cost of the fertilizer, \$11.53, the net gain made by Mr. Saunders merely by the use of fertilizer was \$26.47.
