to 12 feet with 40 teeth. The longer rakes can be used to best advantage when the land is very level. Cleaner teeth, of which there are 6 on a 30 tooth rake keep the hay from rolling and also prevent it from being lifted with the other teeth when the rake is being dumped. In the field two of the things that the operator must not neglect are lubrication and bolted fasteners, especially at the thill connections. There is considerable side whipping especially in a long rake or on even ground that tends to loosen these bolts very quickly. If neglected the bolts will be ruined and the hole in the wood will become greatly enlarged.

The side delivery rake is from 7 1/2 to 8 feet wide. It finds its greatest use in connection with a hay-loader. The hay-loader may, of course, be used after a sulky rake but not with the same ease of handling and there is a tendency to use altogether too heavy windrows, in which case the loader throws an excessive strain on the loader.

The main requirements in the mower itself are simplicity, strength ease of adjustment and lightness of draft. Taking up the parts in detail, the main frame should be stiff and strong, so that all the working parts may be kept in their proper position. The bearings should be roller or ball, according to position, and should be in cages in order that they may be easily removed and cleaned. In the case of the bearing of the crank shaft in the main frame removable bushings are used in place of roller bearings as at this point there is more or less of a pounding action that tends to disturb the bearing, and the bushings can be easily renewed when disturbed. Wheels should be fairly high-wide and with generous-sized lugs as the height makes for greater power while width and lugs give a good grip on the ground. There should be enough pawls to insure instant starting. The gears should be generous in size adjustable to wear and well closed in. Wooden pitman rods are used as metal tends to crystallize under the excessive vibration, and this led to frequent breakin. The cutter bar should be of a high grade of steel to ensure strength and durability, and that it may be springy enough to stand the sudden strains that are put upon it. Some bars are made so that when standing upright the centre curves out a little then when it is placed horizontally it straightens out again. The shoes should be strong, with large bearing surfaces. Hinges should have a large bearing surface as the strain here is great. An outer shoe is better than a wheel, which is jerky in action, as it drops into small depressions in the ground. The tilting lever should have fine adjustments in its quadrant to give a large number of cutting angles. The tongue should be easy to remove, both for repair and storage.

### CHEATER BUG POISON.

Among poisons for the control of biting insects, such as the potato bug Paris Green has been first both in point of time and in popularity. It is now an expensive article, and the farmers are reminded that they are paying the greater part of the price for the green colour, which is of no importance so far as the killing of bugs is concerned. The green tint is due to the large crystals of arsenic when combined with a copper base, the standard metallic bases are copper, lead zinc and lime. Of these copper has advanced greatly in price during the war, and is now nearly in the class of precious metals. The cheapest of the lot is, of course, lime.

When arsenic is combined with lime one resulting compound is arsenate of lime. The appearance of this compound is that of a very fine white powder, and the price is about one third that of Paris Green. Its killing properties, per cent of arsenic, exceed those of the latter as it contains the same poison in a much finer condition so that it remains longer in suspension, thus requiring less stirring, and for the same reason adhering much better to the foliage.

Arsenate of lime is suitable for use alone, or compounded with Bordeaux mixture, on all vegetable crops including potatoes. For fruit trees 5 pounds of water slaked lime should be added to one pound of arsenate.

A tremendous business has sprung up within the past three years in this cheaper poison, partly owing to its effectiveness in controlling the boll weevil, the most serious foe to the cotton crop in the South. It is easily available, and should be on sale at all points. Ask for arsenate of lime and save more than half your outlay for poisons. Mention it to your dealer right away so that he may have an adequate supply on hand when needed.

### CARE OF THE REFRIGERATOR

Keep the refrigerator clean and wash it at least once a week in summer and every two weeks in winter with scalding water in which you have dissolved half a cupful of washing soda in every two quarts of water. The drain pipe should also be cleaned with the long wire pipe brush that comes for the purpose. A refrigerator cannot be kept clean without it. After washing the refrigerator it should be wiped until perfectly dry.

### BLOODY MILK.

Bloody milk is not at all unusual in heifers with first calf, and usually it will disappear after a time. If it occurs in older cows, it is usually caused by injury, such as

And the ice box should be cleaned as well as the shelves where the food stands.

Never put warm foods into a refrigerator for the sake of cooling them off. They not only waste ice, but cause moisture. Chemicals and all foods that have an odor should also be excluded. Sometimes it is essential that foods with an odor be placed where there is ice. If they must go in, cover them well. Fish may be kept for a while in a refrigerator without imparting its odor to other foods, if it is wrapped carefully with waxed paper. Yolks of eggs should be covered, so as to prevent drying. Butter and milk, its absorb odors, should be kept from dead leaves or anything that might possibly taint the atmosphere.

If the food is fresh when put into a refrigerator treated in this way, it can be kept for a reasonable length of time without danger of ptomaine poisoning.

### EVIL EFFECTS OF DECAYED FOOD

Decayed food should never be given to fowls. There is a temptation to do this when meat or vegetables are around the place which have become too old for the family to eat. People thoughtlessly seem to take it for granted that fowls have some way of disposing successfully of the poisons that are set loose in the decomposition of meat and other foods. So far as we know fowls are no more able to do this than any other animal.

These decayed foods will at the least upset the digestion of the fowls and when that is done the way is opened for the advent of real ailments. If given reasonable choice, fowls will not eat decayed food, but if very hungry for some such food as meat will eat it even if pretty badly spoiled.

### THINNING VEGETABLES.

It is usual for far more vegetable seed of be planted and to germinate than it is eventually advisable to let grow and mature. Thinning should be resorted to as there is nothing gained and much lost by allowing the plants to crowd in the row. They starve each other so that none of them develop into good plants.

Soon after the young seedlings have come through the soil they should be carefully thinned, being spaced according to the kind of vegetables and the ultimate size to which the individual plants will attain. It will be found that some plants are much stronger and more vigorous in growth right from the beginning than are others. In thinning this fact should be taken into account and these larger seedlings left whenever possible. Simply discard the superfluous plants. Young beets however if of sufficient size, may be kept and the tops used as greens.

Thinning should ordinarily be done as soon as the plants are large enough to handle nicely. It should not be left till the plants become long and slender and plainly show the effects of overcrowding.

## Shoe Price Peak Past, Say Dealers

(New York Times.)

The peak of high prices in shoes have been reached. Prices are being stabilized rapidly and from now on will be generally lower, based on the lower leather market. High grade shoes, however, still will command high prices. These opinions were advanced by members of the Joint Committee of the national associations of the shoe industry meeting yesterday at the Astor to shape a tentative policy for the fall and spring.

The committee is made up of representatives of the tanning, manufacturing and retailing industries and the meeting was presided over by James P. Orr of Cincinnati, president of the National Retailers' Association.

An informal discussion of market conditions took place at the morning session: A Philadelphia manufacturer said that for May, 1920, Philadelphia retailers exceeded the sales for the corresponding month in previous years. A retailer said he had two thousand pairs of patent leather to get rid of "at any price," another said: "The only way to meet the situation is to pay no attention to price but to sell your stock for cash for whatever you can get and then buy to replenish your stock week to week."

The committee issued a statement retailers taking up market conditions as they enter into the style problem. The report says that "there is a certain amount of uncertainty among retailers who have an idea that the market is going to smash. We do not think so." Present conditions, it adds, are brought about by tight money market, breakdown of transportation systems, a late spring and unseasonable weather, and a resulting over stock in the hands of some retailers. Retailers must place their orders now for the fall to insure fall delivery.
