**Stand of Free Church**

Mr. Parker said he had heard that a certain gentleman had gone to an official of the Church of Scotland and asked that the report be modified. The answer he received was: "What is written, is written."

Mr. Parker also quoted from a report issued by the United Free Church of Scotland which stated they desired to maintain cordial relations with both churches in Canada and the Presbyterian Church in Canada, and were prepared to receive delegates to send delegates to the Supreme Cent of each Church, and to continue to recognize ministers of the undivided Presbyterian Church in Canada.

"That means," said Mr. Parker, "that the Methodist and ex-Confessionalist ministers who went over to the United Church are put on a different standing to the ex-Presbyterians."

"Our whole task has been to retain such relationships with the Presbyterian Churches in the Old Country that Presbyterians immigrating coming to us from England and Ireland would never be in doubt that the Presbyterian Church in Canada was their natural destination," he said.

**The Status Of The Presbyterian Church Settled**

STAFFORD, June 8.—The strains of the Doxology resounded through Knox church yesterday afternoon when the General Assembly received the welcome news that the Church of Scotland had accorded the status which was claimed for itself. The announcement was made by Rev. Stuart C. Parker following his report of the Committee on Correspondence with other churches.

Mr. Parker read a report of a special committee of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland stating that the Presbyterian Church in Canada was on their list for 1902 of regularly constituted Presbyterian Churches, and the report adds, "The relations between the Church of Scotland and the General Assembly of that church remain in 1926 and for the future as they were prior to June 1925." "As for the United Church of Canada," the report proceeds, "the verdict is that while friendly relations should be cultivated, yet the United Church of Canada cannot be strictly classified as a regularly constituted Presbyterian Church."

**The Markets**

(Canadian Press)  
MONTREAL, Que., June 13.—There was some inquiry from the United Kingdom for Canadian spring wheat in the Montreal market over the week end and sales of several loads were made.

A feature of the local grain was the demand from New York exporters for Canadian spring wheat and sales of a few loads of No. 3 northern were made at a cent per bushel over the Winnipeg July option. C. I. F. Montreal. The demand for Canadian winter oats was fair and values were steady. Owing to the strength in the future corn market at Chicago today local dealers advanced prices three cents per bushel for the cash article. Carlets of Argentine corn were quoted at \$1.03 and American sample corn at \$1.04 per bushel, 3x30.

The trade in spring and winter wheat grades of flour was quiet but the undertone was firm. A fair amount of business was done in all lines of millfeed and values were unchanged. The demand for standard grades of rolled oats was fair and prices ruled steady.

Owing to the weakness that has prevailed in the United States markets for new crop potatoes an easier feeling developed in the local market for old crop Canadian stock today and prices were reported fifteen to twenty five cents per bag. Indications are that values will be still lower. The market was quiet. Sales of odd cars of Quebec white "B" grade were made at \$2.50 per bag, and reds at \$2.10 to \$2.25 per bag of ninety pounds in bulk export.

The egg market was moderately active and firm. The receipts were 1,115 cases. The undertone to the butter situation was steady but the volume of business was small. The receipts were 952 packages. A steady feeling prevailed in the cheese market under an improved demand from spot buyers combined with reports that some business was worked with English importers over the week end. Sales of Western grades were made at 17 1/2 cents to 17 3/4 cents per pound. The receipts were 5,508 boxes.

OTTAWA, Ont., June 13.—Receipts are declining in practically all producing sections of Canada and with the percentage of seconds increasing markets are working firmer among the higher grade.

Toronto.—There is no change in the local market with dealers quoting country shippers for ungraded eggs delivered extras 24 to 30, firsts 27, seconds 24 to 25. Extras were scarcer, Western quotations are unchanged and no sales are reported today.

Montreal.—There is a firm tone in this market under short supplies and dealers are quoting country shippers extras 21 to 23, firsts 23 to 30, seconds 25 to 26.

Winnipeg.—Receipts here are light. Dealers are quoting country shippers extras 28, firsts 26, seconds 22.

Saskatchewan.—There is little change in this market. Receipts show slight decrease and seconds are increasing. Dealers paying country shippers ungraded eggs delivered cases returned extras 26 to

the clergy than to drag them into the mire of party politics. It is not a moral issue because the clergy would not be divided in such an issue but would remain firmly united. Having shown the utter failure of Prohibition he declared that the issue is not Prohibition versus Government Control because Mr. Saunders' policy is not that. He says he will make liquor cheaper why make it cheaper if it is only to be used as a medicine. He has not offered to reduce the price of other medicines. Mr. Saunders said he would resign if his Government took on Government Control. I wonder, said Premier Stewart, if he would resign if his plebiscite was carried in favor of Government Control. His policy is merely a bundle of inconsistencies.

The expenses in this campaign, said Premier Stewart, are being provided by ourselves according to law. It has been stated or rather insinuated that the expenses of the Conservative party and particularly the expenses of Mrs. Falls' visit, are the brewers and distillers. He wants to brand that statement as an absolute falsehood.

In conclusion, he stated, that the only object of the Government is to improve conditions and make things a little better. All the Government asks is that the people look at the issue fairly and squarely and they will be satisfied with any verdict.

Premier Stewart sat down amid tremendous applause. He was followed by Mr. Claire Campbell, Liberal supporter who in a long speech criticized the present Government, criticisms which did not seem to register with the audience but were the cause of many adverse remarks and fun for the audience.

Mr. Peter Brodie, the chairman concluded with a scathing denunciation of the present Prohibition Law and a severe criticism of the attitude of the Temperance Alliance, who he declared should have stood out years ago to make the stand they are making today. He paid a glowing tribute to the accomplishments of the present administration, and concluded with the remark that it is near time we were getting Government Control.

The meeting closed with a vote of thanks and the rendition of the National Anthem.

Councillor Schurman was appointed to act as Mayor for the next few days during the absence of Mayor Arnett.

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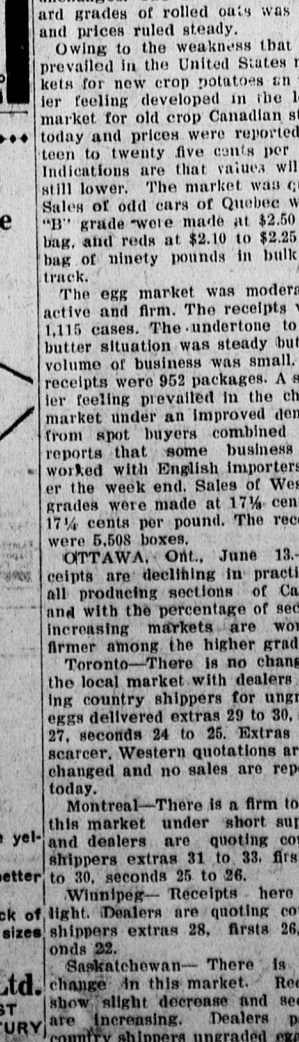
