SUBSIDY CLAIMS (Continued from page 1) mission had already dealt with the matter and that it was now simply a question of fixing the amount. Other speakers, however, disagreed, including Hon. J. A. MacDonnell, Messrs H. F. MacPhee, W. F. Tidmarsh, R. E. Mutch and Donald MacKinnon, K. C. A resolution, moved by Mr. Tidmarsh and seconded by Mr. Mutch, after considerable discussion and amendment, was finally adopted unanimously as follows: "RESOLVED that the Council of the Charlottetown Board of Trade take into careful consideration the advisability of submitting the claims of this Province for an increased subsidy to a Royal Commission, similar to the Manitoba Commission, to investigate and report its findings to the respective Governments; And the Council of this Board be requested to act in conjunction with the Provincial Government to bring this issue to a satisfactory conclusion.

Reference to Premier Saunders' present visit to Ottawa in connection with subsidy claims was made by some of the speakers. It was intimated however, that it was not the Premier's present purpose to make a formal presentation, but rather to seek a definite opportunity of doing so.

Senator Hughes address follows: Mr. President and Gentlemen: I am very glad to have this opportunity of discussing with you some of the public questions which are of considerable importance to our province and to each of us individually. A few weeks ago six or seven gentlemen happened to meet informally in the Charlottetown Club, and the subject of federal subsidies was incidentally mentioned. Some expressed the idea that if our subsidies were increased by 200,000 dollars a year we would be justly if not generously, treated by the Dominion; that we could easily raise two or three hundred thousand more locally, and we would then be in a sound financial position. I dissented from both propositions, because I believed that \$300,000 additional federal subsidy would be entirely inadequate to our needs and wholly unjust to us as a province, and I thought that four or five hundred thousand additional revenue would not place us in a healthy financial position, or

burden of this great event, and Canada joined the assembled nations in the sincere and earnest hope that definite and practical results may be achieved. Mr. Ralston added. The Canadian delegate's speech was as follows: For the Dominion of Canada I humbly thank His Majesty for his gracious welcome. The eloquent words to which we have just listened have emphasized the satisfaction which is everywhere apparent that His Majesty has honored and signally marked this occasion by His Royal presence and his memorable and fitting speech. While His Majesty's participation is welcomed by all the nations represented here it is received by the nations of the British Commonwealth with peculiar pleasure. Each has its separate sphere and authority; there is no subordination among ourselves, but the allegiance and loyalty which each bears to the Crown in the person of His Majesty supplies the living expression of the tie which united this Commonwealth. Let me say also that in no part of the Empire could there exist greater devotion and affection to our Sovereign than in Canada, where the descendants of two great races have with those who come from time to time to our shores united to develop and to preserve a nationality which rests for its harmony, its tolerance and its assurance of liberty on the freedom and security guaranteed by the British Crown.

Canada comes here with no assumption of undue prominence or importance; she hopes particularly for the opportunity to be useful and helpful to those who will bear the burden of this great event. She is fully conscious that she is so situated as to be sharing in some degree the anxiety which other nations experience regarding security. At the same time she has been ready to assume what she conceives to be her national responsibility and has shared in full measure with the nations of the world the bitter experiences of war. Our Dominion is in close accord with the development in world affairs to which you Mr. Prime Minister have referred, which looks not wholly towards armament for security, but also toward machinery which forestalls the necessity for force by disposing of differences on the basis of discussion and reason. If her experiences in this respect can be put to service in the deliberations of this conference, we gladly tender it for this purpose and so Canada joins with the nations assembled here in the sincere and earnest hope that definite and practical results may be achieved.

Concerning the questions which confront this Conference and may I add these hopes are animated and intensified by the thought that a successful outcome of this mission will be received by an anxious world as evidence of a genuine determination to work out ways and means for the pacific settlement of international differences and we cannot forget that after all this ultimate accomplishment this high enterprise, is the supreme business to which the nations of the world have pledged unalterably their national honor and their joint endeavor.

LONDON, Jan. 21—Stealing quietly and unobtrusively into the picture after the conclusion of the opening meeting of the Five Power Naval Conference, Parliament today resumed its sessions interrupted on Christmas eve by the holiday interval. There was no ceremony, the Commons, plunging immediately into routine business with the usual flood of questions mostly affecting domestic affairs.

Mr. MacDonald took the chair vacated by the King and immediately upon his designation as chairman, began his own address urging in an eloquent speech the necessity for enlightening the spirit of confidence among peoples and thus paving the way for an agreement to halt competition in naval construction. "The whole world," he stated "expects it as we shall deliberate and negotiate on the assumption that having put our names to pacts of peace we mean to respect our signatures."

Col. Stimson addressed the assembly when Mr. MacDonald had concluded his speech, remarking that the present effort at naval limitation was not to be regarded as final by any means. "Naval limitation is a continuous process," he said. "We regard disarmament as a goal to be reached by successive steps by frequent revision and improvement. A solution reached today however perfect may not respond to conditions at a later date."

Col. Stimson pledged the cooperation of the U. S. to further endeavor in behalf of disarmament both land, naval and in the air.
