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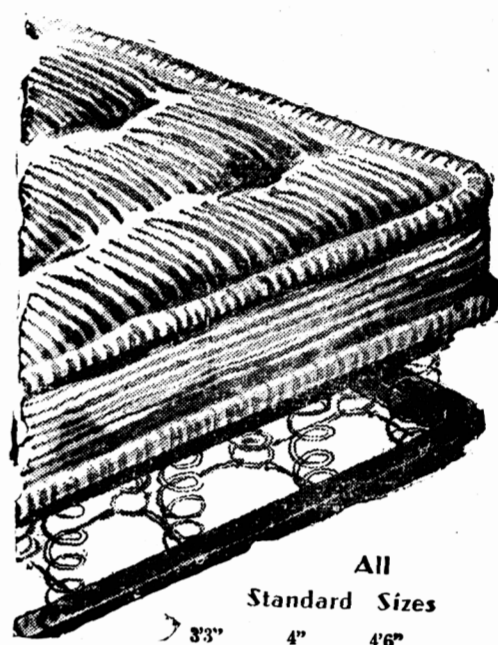
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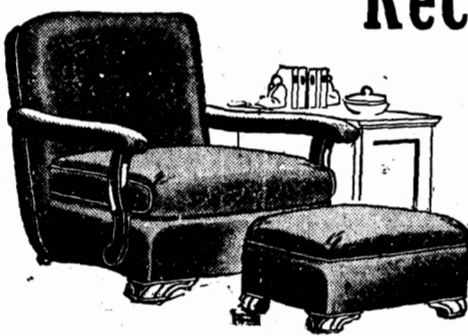
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Plan Conference On Tourist Trade

OTTAWA, July 30 - (CP)—A second Dominion-Provincial conference to discuss the Canadian tourist industry will be held in Ottawa Sept. 30 to Oct. 2, Trade Minister MacKinnon announced today. The conference will review and discuss the results of the 1947 tourist season and set the groundwork of a co-operative program for the whole industry in 1948. Mr. MacKinnon said it is intended that the operations of all agencies active in the travel field should become even more closely integrated than at present and plans designed to bring about that end would be stressed in discussions.
