MUST COMPLY WITH BOARD REGULATIONS

(C. F. by Guardian's Special Wire) FREDERICTON, N. B., Feb. 20.—Potato buyers in the big eastern markets who bought heavily under the low prices which were in effect before the Eastern Canada Potato Marketing Board came into being and raised the prices, are being compelled to comply with the regulations of the board.

The board decided, at its recent meeting in Montreal, to allow the buyers in question until the end of this week to dispose of stock graded under the old regulations. Any stock still unsold will either have to be marked down as Eastern Canada No. 2, or re-graded under the standard of Eastern Canada No. 1.

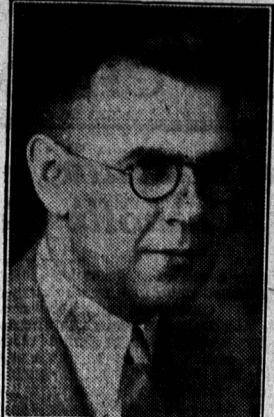
The feeling has been voiced in some quarters that an insufficient proportion of the price increase under the board's schedule is being passed on by the shippers to the producers. It is considered, however, that, as soon as adjustments are made on consuming markets, local dealers will be able to give larger returns to the growers.
