REQUIREMENT OF THE HORSE MARKET
By Theodore Ross (Continued)

I wrote last week of General Appearance and Condition. The next most important quality is Soundness. Blemishes are generally the external evidence of weakness, and to meet the market demand the horse must be able to do a reasonable amount of work without undue fatigue or indications of a premature break-down. As fast work is much more difficult than heavy work, soundness of limb is more important in light horses than heavy, but in neither is anything permitted that is likely to cause lameness or soreness in anyway.

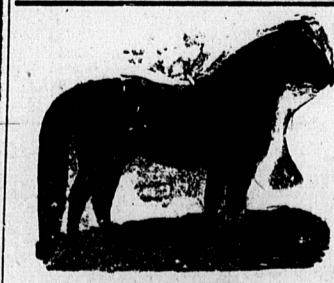
Broken wind, thick wind, side bones black hocks, large splints and broken knees are largely discriminated against. Conformation comes next. If a horse is to do hard work with a minimum amount of wear, and give the longest possible period of service he must possess a conformation indicative of strength, endurance and longevity the indications of which are good feet, good feeding qualities, good bone and symmetry. As horses are generally purchased for use in the cities too much emphasis cannot be placed on the requirement of good feet. The life of a city horse depends nearly always on the quality of his feet.

A deep broad capacious chest, indicating a good constitution, tells us that the horse will make good use of his food. Endurance is shown by a short, well muscled back and loins. He must have plenty of bone of good quality. Symmetry of form is necessary for strength, and perfect development. A longlegged, narrow-chested, wasp-waisted, loose-ribbed, long-coupled horse is always a cheap animal on the market. (To be continued)

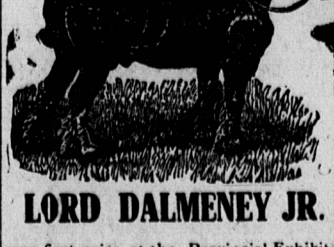

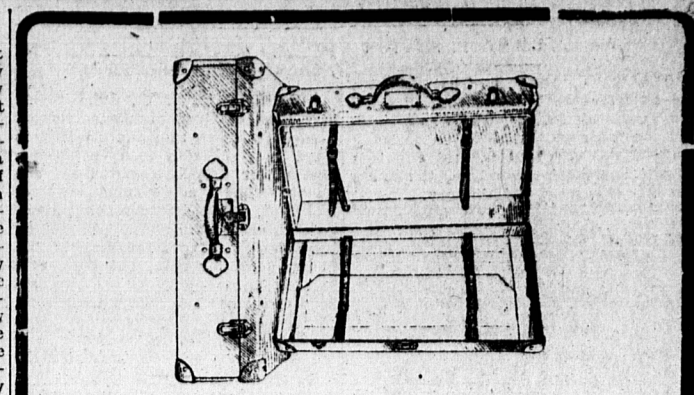

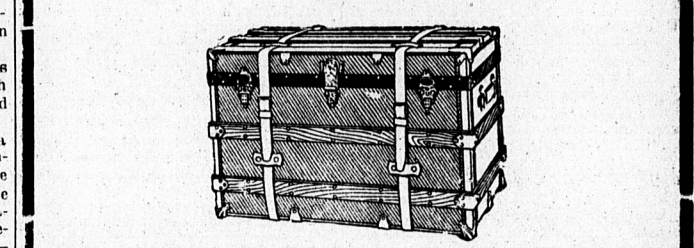
