The price of the other products remained the same as on last day. The outside market was not so brisk. Oats called for sixty cents a bus. for black and fifty-eight a bus for white. Pressed hay sold at nine fifty a ton and loose at fifty to fifty-five a cwt., while pressed straw sold at five dollars a ton and loose at 30 cents a cwt. Potatoes were sold at twenty-five cents a bus. The fish market was also well attended and prices were the same as last quoted.
