VICTIMS OF ACCIDENT

Twenty thousand children under fourteen years of age are killed by accidents each year in the United States according to figures just made by the public American Red Cross. Burns, falls, automobile and other vehicular accidents, drowning and poisoning exact the heaviest toll of child life. Forty per cent of the children who die before reaching their fifth birthday, are killed accidentally while almost twenty per cent of the deaths claiming those between five and fourteen result from accidents. The compilation shows. After fourteen, accidents cause proportionately fewer deaths. First-aid instruction given swimmers throughout the United States by the Red Cross reduced drowning fatalities from 10,000 to 5,000 annually, the statement said.

DRUGGIST MADE MISTAKE

Mrs. Ethel Resnick, Toronto, came to her death on February 13 as a result of a mistake made by Frank Crowell, druggist, in dispensing barium sulphate instead of barium sulphate, according to the verdict of a coroner's jury at an inquest. Dr. M. A. Pollock had prescribed barium sulphate for Mrs. Resnick and it was in filling his prescription that the druggist made the mistake.

NO MORE FILM EYE-STRAIN

Film eye-strain, otherwise known as "flicker," has been abolished. A new projection shutter which not only relieves the eyes of strain but rests them, was demonstrated in a British film company's private theatre. This device revolutionizes the business of film exhibition. Its use may even be made compulsory. The inventor is Mr. Martin Harper, a young Londoner connected with the technical side of cinematography.

ALBERTA COW BILL LOANS ARE STOPPED

A halt has been called to the loaning of money under the Alberta Livestock Encouragement Act, popularly known as the Cow Bill. Loans totalling \$1,723,916 have been made since the scheme was first introduced in 1917, and the Government has decided that it will now be advisable to suspend the operation of the act for a time, though it will be resumed later. The purpose of the loans is to aid farmers in the purchase of cattle, the livestock industry being recognized as one of the province's main resources. Groups of farmers are formed, their notes taken for the full amount of the loans, the money advanced by one of the chartered banks and the loans guaranteed by the government. In the four years 772 loans have been granted out of 1,287 applied for, and there are now about 30,000 head of cattle in Alberta that were bought in this way.

VETERANS' CLUBS DEMAND

"Unless the returned soldiers' clubs are allowed to sell beer under government control they will be driven out of existence and the splendid work we are carrying on will be stopped," declared Captain Jim MacKenzie, Vancouver, in speaking on the liquor bill in the Legislature. Captain MacKenzie explained that he was speaking as a director of the Moderation League and as the representative of practically all returned soldiers' organizations in the province. Captain MacKenzie suggested that all vendors appointed by the government, under the liquor act, should be men who had suffered disability in active service. R. H. Pooley, Esq., minister, referring to the proposed liquor commission, advocated British Columbia following the policy of Quebec and appoint two or three judges on the commission and not politicians.

NIAGARA POWER

If the falls of Niagara were fully utilized it is computed that they would supply energy equal to 7,000,000 horse power, while on the upper Mississippi 2,000,000 such units of work should be available.

GOVERNMENT SWINE

The province has found a new source of revenue—it is now in the swine breeding business. At the four institutional farms over which Hon. A. P. McNab, Regina, minister of public works, presides, there are now 255 swine. The sales of the Government-owned swine for 1920 netted the province over \$3,600.

CUT PRICE OF BREAD

The price of the one and a half pound loaf of ordinary bread will be dropped 3 1/2 cents, and the price of fancy breads 1 1/2 cents on Monday by most of the English bakers in Montreal, it was announced. Competition for new business by the leading bakers is said to be responsible for the cut in prices.

ENORMOUS PULP CUT

The pulpwood cut of Northern Ontario last year, if gathered together and placed in a pile four feet high, in a continuous line, would stretch from Pequot Falls, Ont., to Toronto, according to a statement made by Public School Inspector Wilson, in an address given to the pupils of the High School Toronto. Pulpwood is cut in four foot lengths and the distance between Pequot Falls and Toronto is about 460 miles.

ABITIBI COMPANY SELLS MORE BONDS

Directors of the Abitibi Power and Paper Company Limited, met and gave out an official statement that they had approved of the sale of \$4,000,000 par value of eight per cent, ten year consolidated mortgage sinking fund bonds to Peabody, Houghtelling and Company of Chicago and New York. These are being issued to reimburse the treasury of the company for construction expenditures on its new plant and are a part of the total authorized issue of \$14,000,000. It was stated that the company's new plants would be ready for operation on May 1st next. The question of the dividend on the common stock was not considered and will be dealt with at the regular meeting about the middle of March. It is understood that the new bond issue will be confined exclusively to the United States.

Fighters Said To Foretell Defeat

NEW YORK—"Champions sometimes have premonition of coming defeat," says a student of boxing, and he specifies Sullivan and Jeffries as examples of pugilistic kings who felt their throats tastering. It is set forth that Sullivan was moody just before the battle with Corbett, and this was taken to mean that the Strong Boy feared the result of the meeting. Possibly Sullivan did have a premonition of defeat, but his backers did not, for they wagered 5 to 1 on the chances of the champion at ringtime. They never stopped betting till it was evident Corbett had the fight practically won.

The attitude of Sullivan's backers in reference to the Sullivan-Corbett affair was in sharp contrast to their demeanor regarding a match with Jackson. It was quite apparent that Wakely and Johnson, Sullivan's managers, had a strong premonition of impending defeat for the champion, and they utterly declined to sign articles for a meeting between the men.

Jeffries is pictured as being close to collapse when he entered the ring at Reno, and the suggestion is made that "some unknown force" was sending the message of defeat to him. It is true that Jeffries had difficulty in keeping erect previous to his bout with Johnson, but it was not "unknown force" that sent a message of defeat. It was Jack Johnson who sent the message, and it caused Jeffries to have premonitions and chills. Johnson had tricked the former champion with a proposal to "stop" in the twelfth round, and a few hours before entering the ring the negro served notice on Jeffries that he "would have to fight." That is what caused Jeff to spread his feet in order to hold himself up as he was getting the referee's final instructions. Jeff had been out of the ring for five years, while Johnson was then in his prime, and the boxer knew he had not a ghost of a chance. That the burly negro. He made the match only after an understanding that Johnson did not intend to try. Jeff was double crossed.
