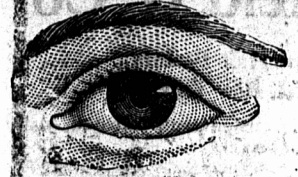
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FASHIONS AND FADS.

Pour olive oil into the bottle if you

Never leave the furnace ashes uncovered after sifting. Sprinkle with water and leave tightly covered.

But a rose geranium leaf on top of newly made jelly before sealing it, you would have a delicious flavor.

It saves time and money to dry dishes in a wire dish drainer set close to the dish pan on the kitchen table.

To remove stains from a vinegar crust, fill with grated raw potato and let stand. Then rinse with clear cold water.

For light colored stockings that fold them a great many times and use for holders. Or put them in a mop handle for a mop dry.

A good soft icing is made with two cups of granulated sugar and three quarter cup sweet milk, boiled three minutes. Cool, beat and flavor.

For light colored stockings that show "leather stain," put two table spoonfuls of borax in enough water to wash five pairs of shoes.

SACRED SPOT CAUSE OF MANY GLASSES.

The one spot which more than any other has controlled the history of Europe, says the Christian Herald, is, strangely enough, not in Europe itself but in Asia. For the possession of the site where Christ "suffered" was buried and rose again, more than have been slain than for any other. An immense number of lives were laid down during the Crusades, and for six hundred years before the Crusades, and even to the present time, a constant stream of pilgrims has poured into Jerusalem to worship at the spot made sacred by the crucifixion of Christ.

From the fourth Century after Christ until fifty years ago this site was generally conceded to be within the Church of the Holy Sepulchre. Now two sites dispute the claim of being the actual Golgotha. This latter claimant is known as "Gordon's Calvary," though to an American, Dr. Harlan P. Beach, of Yale University, is due the actual discovery of it, General Gordon, the hero of Khartoum, having first obtained for it general recognition.

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
