GRAND MASTER WALLACE.

At the seventy-first annual meeting of the Grand Orange Lodge of British America held a few days ago in London, Ont., the Grand Master, Hon. N. Clarke Wallace, opened the meeting with an address which is in part a campaign speech against the Laurier Government.

Two passages culled from the address will sufficiently show its partisan color. Mr. Wallace said: "Had the views of the Prime Minister prevailed there would be no Canadian Contingent with the British forces."

Mr. Wallace has been Grand Master of the Grand Lodge since 1887, during which time he was for several years Controller of Customs in the Administrations of Sir John Thompson and Sir Mackenzie Bowell.

This explanation seems to be necessary to a right understanding of the Grand Master's address, because in the Eastern Provinces happily a different order of things prevails and there are many Orangemen identified with the support of both parties, while the lodges and Grand Lodges do not attempt to control the political course of their membership.

Hon. Clarke Wallace, while an ardent Conservative, is entitled to the credit of having resigned his portfolio in Sir Mackenzie Bowell's Administration in 1895 on account of the attempt to force separate schools upon Manitoba.

Besides, we regard the first utterance above quoted from the Grand Master's address as simply untrue in fact. Whatever may be the faults of the Laurier Government it may be fairly claimed for them that they have not only done more to assist the Mother Country in the present war than any previous Canadian Government had done on any like occasion, but more than all previous Canadian Governments together.

In the bill to provide for abolishing ward elections would it not be well to provide that the elections shall be by ballot? In almost every city of this continent the ballot system is used in civic elections and we know of no instance in which a return to open voting has been asked for where the ballot has been tried.

The Manitoba Prohibition bill is arranged to go into operation on 1st January, 1901 and it is announced with a considerable flourish that the liquor men will ask for two million dollars compensation.

States but the principle of compensation has never been recognized. It is not founded in right and justice. In fact when the Scott Act has prohibited the sale in many counties of Canada the liquor men have never had the hardihood to make a claim for compensation.
