## WHAT BURROUGHS ESCAPED.

John Burroughs looks back most sagaciously over his seventy years. Here are some of his observations: "From the summit of the years I look back over my life, and see what I have escaped and what I have missed, as a traveller might look back over his course from a mountain-top, and see where he had escaped a jungle or a wilderness or a desert, and where he had missed a field or a fountain, or pleasant habitations."

"I have escaped the soul-killing and body-wrecking occupations that are the fate of so many men in my time. I have escaped the greed of wealth, the 'mania of owning things,' as Whitman called it. I have escaped the disappointment of political ambition, of business ambition, of social ambition; I have never been a cog

in anybody's wheel, or an attachment to the tail of anybody's kite.

"It is a question whether in escaping a college education I made a hit or a miss. I thank heaven that in literature I have never had to dissect Shakespeare or Milton, or any other great poet, in the classroom, and that I have never had to dissect any animal in the laboratory. I have had the poets in their beautiful and stimulating unity and wholeness, and I have had the animals in the fields and woods in the joy of their natural activities."

"In my literary career I have escaped trying to write for the public or for editors; I have written for myself. I have not asked, 'What does the public want?' I have only asked: 'What do I want to say? What is there in my heart craving for expression? What have I lived or felt or thought that is my own, and has its root in my inmost being?'"

## MOTOR SOMERSAULTS CONTINUE RACE.

HAMILTON, Ont., Aug. 9.—A most unusual accident occurred here this morning during the motor boat races at the beach. It was in a race for speed aquaplanes when Heloise, owned by W. H. Gooderham of Toronto, furnished some excitement. The boat which is the speediest in Canadian waters, was going at a high rate and when passing the buoy at Station No. 10, got too close and struck the buoy. The impact caused the boat to turn a complete somersault which threw Mr. Gooderham and mechanic, J. Watson, out in the waters of the bay. The boat, strange to say, righted itself and raced away round the course.

## NEW DEVELOPMENT IN ROSENTHAL CASE.

NEW YORK, Aug. 9.—By far the most interesting development in a many sided investigation into the murder of Gambler Rosenthal and the surrounding muck of police graft, is news of John D. Rockefeller, Jr.'s quiet complimentary inquiry into conditions in the lower world particularly the so called "White slave Traffic." While Mr. Rockefeller and agents decline to discuss the matter, Mr. Whitman, District Attorney, will furnish no details. It is generally credited that through the establishment of what is supposed to be a disorderly house in the Tenderloin, agents for Mr. Rockefeller have gathered a great deal of valuable material. It was gathered primarily for representation to congress and legislature as a basis for corrective legislation dealing with traffic in girls.

## MINUTES OF PRESBYTERY.

The Presbytery of Prince Edward Island met in St. James' Hall, Charlottetown, on Tuesday, the sixth day of August, one thousand nine hundred and twelve, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, and was constituted by the Moderator. There were present Messrs. A. S. Stewart, Moderator, T. F. Fullerton, W. H. Spencer, E. J. Rattay, M. N. McLeod, John Murray, A. Craige, John Gillis, D. B. McLeod, R. P. Murray, D. Fraser, J. W. McKenzie, H. J. Fraser, A. McKay, A. D. McIntosh, A. J. W. Back, ministers. T. C. James, Lieut. Gov. Rogers, R. Munn, D. McLaren, Charles Heckbert, John A. Lawson, and C. H. S. Sterns, elders.

Minutes of meetings held on May the fourteenth, June the fourth, and the twenty-seventh, one thousand nine hundred and twelve, being the hands of members in printed form, were held as read and sustained.

Mr. A. J. McNeill was elected Moderator for the ensuing six months.

A letter was read from Mr. R. Murray in regard to matters at Richmond Bay West and Inverness. On motion the clerk was instructed to recognize, through Mr. Murray, the action taken by the session of Richmond Bay West, and to express the satisfaction of the Presbytery there with; and to state further that the Presbytery had no intention of severing the Victoria West section from the congregation of Richmond Bay West. The communications from Mr. Murray were ordered to be held in retentis. An extract was read from records of the General Assembly (1912) which stated that full annuity had been granted from the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund to Mr. A. B. McLeod for another year beginning with the first day of June last. It was moved by Mr. D. Fraser, seconded by Mr. M. N. McLeod, and carried, that Mr. T. F. Fullerton be nominated Moderator of the Synod which meets at Pictou, Nova Scotia, on the first day of October next.

Elders' commissions were received from the following sessions, and their names ordered to be placed on the roll of Presbytery, namely, Cardigan, West River, Orwell, Bedouque, Valley-

The clerk was authorized to place on the roll the names of representative elders duly appointed and transmitted to him.

The clerk read the report of the Presbytery of the Woman's Foreign and Home Missionary Societies, as follows:—Receipts, Foreign Missions, two thousand two hundred and forty-nine dollars (\$249); Home Missions three hundred and six dollars (\$306), total, two thousand five hundred and fifty-five dollars (\$2555). Number of Auxiliaries forty two (42), Mission Bands, twenty-nine (29). Presbytery received this report, expressed gratification at the success of the past year, and commended the work of the society. Messrs D. Fraser, W. H. Spencer, and James Douglas (Edmonton) reported on their attendance at the General Assembly. A circular from the convenor of the General Assembly's committee on augmentation in regard to the new minimum stipend was read. After discussion it was moved by Mr. E. J. Rattay, seconded by Mr. T. F. Fullerton, and carried, that the matter of readjusting of congregations with regard to the regulations of the General Assembly as to the new minimum of nine hundred dollars (\$900) be left in the hands of the augmentation committee.
