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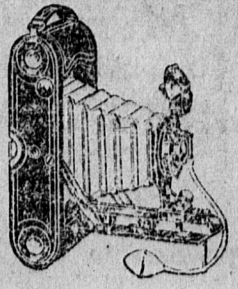

EGG CIRCLE FORMED.—A very large meeting of farmers was held in Hope River hall on Monday evening, the 22nd inst. Mr. Benson was present and delivered a very interesting and instructive address on poultry and egg-production. After a pretty full discussion by a number of farmers the meeting proceeded to organize an egg circle, and elected a board of directors to complete the organization and appoint a manager after which they will be prepared for business. Co-operation in this matter of marketing eggs is in the air and egg producers have at last taken in hand to reform the egg trade by sending forward promptly to the consuming centres, clean, fresh eggs that command the highest price, and by cutting out the middlemen they will cut out the delay that spells disaster to the egg trade in the warm weather, and also save expense in marketing. Practical co-operation like this will be educative as well as profitable and will likely result in farmers extending the principle to other lines of their varied industry.

LLOYD GEORGE'S SERMON

Insurance Act a Huge Co-operative Benefit and Success, He Says

"We are teaching the people of this country, through the medium of an Act of Parliament, the great Scriptural lesson, 'Bear ye one another's burdens,'" said Mr. Lloyd George in a speech at Cricketh, Wales, on the Insurance Act. "You will find that text on every insurance card. In practice the employers help the employed, the hale working man helps the sick, the strong man helps the feeble children, and those who are neither employers nor employed help as ratepayers and taxpayers. They said we should have no doctors; we have an army of 15,000 guarding the sick beds of our industrial homes.

"They said we should have no sanatoria; we have 6,000 workmen in excellent institutions receiving the best treatment; and they thank God for that Insurance Act. We have scores of thousands receiving sick pay who, but for the Insurance Act, would be at this moment without a spare penny. "When you consider the gigantic character of the task we had in hand, it is marvellous to me so much has been accomplished. Before the Insurance Act we had barely 5,000,000 of the industrial population of the country insured against sickness. You have now 14,000,000. The old societies alone have increased their numbers by 2,500,000; new societies have sprung up with an aggregate of 5,000,000 members.

"Just imagine if the Insurance Act had not been passed and what would happen if suddenly the population of this country had voluntarily thronged to the offices of friendly societies and the insurance companies and asked to be insured against sickness. You can imagine the disturbance, delays, and confusion which would necessarily arise in all those offices."

It is surprising the large number of people in Charlottetown who, when they want to inquire about their Morning Daily Guardian or subscription, ask Central for the News phone No. 132.3, instead of 132.2, or when they want to inquire about advertising ask Central for the Subscription phone No. 132-2, or for the News Phone No. 133, instead of 132-3; or when they want the News or Editorial Department ask Central for the Subscription phone No. 132-2, or the Advertising phone No. 132-3, instead of 133, although all those departments are plainly given in the telephone book. Some people, instead of looking at the book, even phone one want will greatly lessen the work of other department. All this is a great waste of time on the part of the person phoning, the operator at the Central, and the clerk in the department wrongly phoned. The news staff, on an upper floor, cannot give the necessary information about either advertising or subscriptions, nor the advertising staff about subscriptions or news, nor the subscription staff about advertising or news. In other words the clerks know and can do but their own work in their own departments, and if it were otherwise they would be continually running from one department to another, upstairs and down, mixing work, wearing themselves out and causing the greatest possible confusion. On and after 6 p. m. daily it is useless to ask for any phone numbers except 132 and 133. Patrons who consult their phone books for the numbers they really want number to ask for to get at the patient Central telephone and Guardian clerks and thus help make their lives much brighter and happier.

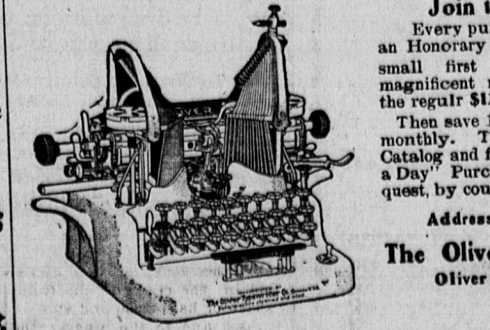
