Varied Issues Short Session Is Prediction

OTTAWA, Jan. 17—Trade and international affairs promise to bulk large in the debates of parliament which opens Jan. 14, with prospects of a short but active session. While no legislation of starting new import is expected, the program before the members of Senate and House of Commons will have the merit of variety of interest.

The coronation of George VI in his final successful effort to shorten the session. Prorogation may come in April. Usually the session runs into June and often into July.

The past year has seen Canada's trade, both external and domestic, mounting at an encouraging rate. On the international scene, however, threats of war have cast a gloomy shadow over economic improvement. These threats may react on the floor of parliament in the form of a review of Canada's position in the League of Nations, an expanded national defence program or demands for one or both.

Prime Minister Mackenzie King will lead a discussion on international affairs with an account of his representation of Canada at the 1936 assembly of the League. Parliament will be asked to ratify the trade treaty with Germany and may be called upon to ratify a revised trade agreement with the United Kingdom. Negotiations on the latter have been proceeding with a view to ratification at this session if possible. New concessions to the United Kingdom in the form of reductions in the textile duties may appear in the treaty.

The textile industry has been probed by a Royal Commissioner. Mr. Justice W. F. A. Turgeon, and his report will probably be laid before parliament. It is expected to contain recommendations on tariff rates.

New legislation on wheat marketing and on the so-called reform laws now before the courts is not expected this year. The decision of the judicial committee of the privy council on the Natural Products Marketing Act, the Employment and Social Insurance Act and other measures will probably come too late to permit the introduction of new legislation at the short session.

As for wheat the government's chief prober, Mr. Justice Turgeon, is in the middle of his inquiry into wheat marketing generally and the operation of the present wheat board. It is probable, therefore, the present wheat board act will continue without major change for another year.

Executive action approving of the abdication of King Edward VIII and the proclamation of his successor will require parliamentary approval in the form of a bill or resolution.

Deal With U. S. Trade

Last session parliament ratified the trade treaty with the United States and members will have something to say this session on its first year of operation. In addition their eyes will turn towards Washington as they watch President Roosevelt in his projected drive to obtain Congressional approval for the St. Lawrence Waterways Treaty. They will also be asked to ratify an agreement with the United States providing for mutual reduction in income taxes on residents of either country in respect of income derived from property in the other.

Unemployment and relief are perennial topics and members will be able to appraise the initial efforts of the National Employment Commission. New housing legislation with the double-barrelled purpose of providing employment and improving the dwellings of Canadian citizens will be presented.

Hon. Charles Dunning, minister of finance, will likely have some vital material to work on in his budget speech. He will be able to report unexpected increases in revenue, perhaps offset to some extent by increased expenditure. He will urge continuing efforts to reach a balanced budget but whether he will forecast the achievement of this aim in 1937-38 is problematical.

Arising out of the recent meeting of the national finance committee legislation will be introduced to strike out the "gold clause" from all contracts to pay, including some \$3,000,000,000 worth of federal, provincial, municipal and corporation bonds and debentures.
