TO REPAIR STAINED WALL PAPER.

Of the many ills the householder is heir to, few are more annoying than the discoloration of wallpapers resulting from damp, burst pipes, or overflowing cisterns. It is sometimes possible to cover the spot with a piece of paper to match, but very often this is not available and in such a case it is an excellent idea to apply to any artist's colorman, and from amongst his French pastels match the tint of the paper exactly. Occasionally it may be necessary to rub two pastels together. When the desired color has been made, the marks left can be worked out, and with a little skill and care the pattern can even be redrawn so as to fit in to the uninjured portions. NEW COLORS IN DRESS

Where the question of woman's dress is concerned there is perhaps no more interesting feature than the study of color for year by year we realize more fully what an immense scope there is for artistic skill in this direction and what a real delight the production of beautiful color schemes can be.

Look back through the past decades and notice how greatly ideas on this particular subject have varied, says the London Globe. Early in the fourteenth and fifteenth centuries the dress of the day was more wonderful in its combinations of rich hues than at any other time. The Renaissance period brought with it the use of purples and reds and lovely tones of green and blue that were lavishly robes for the favored and jeweled while from Italy came the exquisite brocades and stamped velvets that were manufactured in Florence and Venice, more beautiful in color and design than any material that had ever before been seen and which with all our modern knowledge we still copy faithfully and find as lovely as anything of present day workmanship.

Later on came the delicate silks and satins of Georgian days, with new tones of blue and pink that originated in France, and the combination of all kinds of soft shades, especially pinks and dull blues that for over a hundred years held their place in favor with both men and women.

Eventually we arrived the early Victorian era with its crude tones of reds, greens and yellows, and the use of much more and the weaving of dress materials that are almost an eye-sore to the twentieth century notions but to which all the same, we are indebted for much that we admire today.

With forty pairs of foxes breeding, if two or three pairs should prove to be barren it would have no material effect on the annual dividends, but if only five pairs were in the ranch and the same thing occurred it would make the dividends comparatively small.
