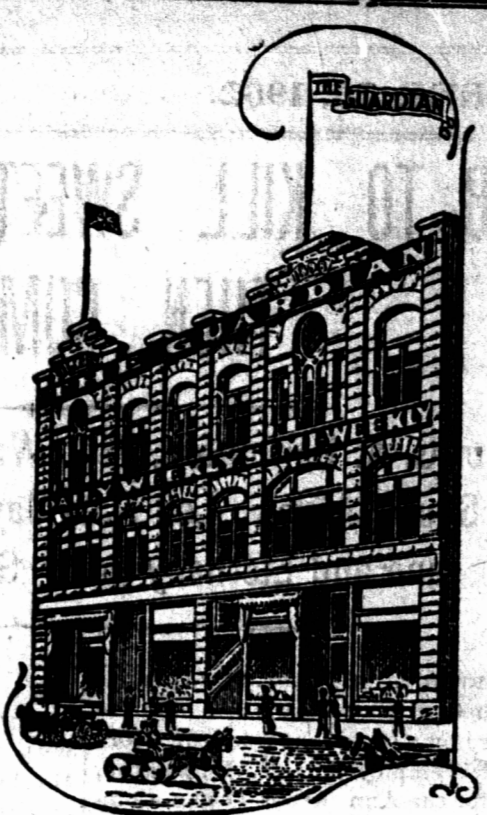

THE "RESPECTABLE" SALOON.

We often hear it said by the opponents of prohibition that the delegating of the traffic drives it into dens and slums to be conducted by disreputable persons and that thus the evils of the traffic are increased rather than diminished. "What we need is high licence," such persons say, "and then a better class of men would handle it, better liquors would take the place of the vile stuff that is sold, and there would be less drunkenness." It may be worth while to examine these statements in the light of facts as they have been disclosed in this city within a few years past and down to the present time.

Our City has had a varied experience. We have had the Scott Act at various times, with intervals of regulation and \$200 a year tax or licence. One noticeable feature has been that with a few exceptions the same men have been in the liquor business right along. We do not deny that there are various grades of men who sell, but in one regard they have been much alike. They would sell, if opportunity offered whether their traffic was legal or illegal. When we had the Scott Act although the traffic was less, were they not one and all violators of that Act, Witnesses, the police court records and the names of those fined and sent to jail. Under the Regulation Act the same men were selling, and violating the few instructions that the act imposed—selling after hours, selling on Sunday, selling to Indians. Under the Licence Act it was the same. The same men pelling in the same places, a little more confident of their respectability, selling the same sort of stuff, we presume, at least making men drunken in larger numbers than before. And as before they violated the law, sold after hours, sold on Sundays, sold to minors and all comers.

For some time past we have had a Prohibitory Law, which though for a long time inadequately administered, has we believe accomplished some good with a prospect now of becoming an effectual weapon, against the lawless traffic. The law has been shamefully violated, it is true, and by whom? By the men who have been in the business for years, men whom no laws can bind, and have violated every law that has yet been made for the regulation, restriction or prohibition of the liquor traffic. That drink makes the drunkard lawless we all know. That the traffic has been and is in the hands of lawless men who can doubt, in view of the records of convictions from time to time made? And does any one doubt that if we had high licence it would be the same?

To those who know the town it is easy to select a few of those who would be in the liquor business if we had high licence and the "respectable" saloon. We doubt not that there are a few who would willingly pay from \$500 to \$1000 yearly for the privilege and the partial monopoly of the sale of liquor in Charlottetown provided that it could be cloaked with the "respectability" of legal sanction. And what manner of saloon should we then have? Just such as one of the more "respectable" of these men here-to-fore in the traffic have conducted in the past, but more open, more destructive, more heart breaking to the fathers and mothers of our City than what we have now or what we have had heretofore. We got a glimpse the other day—a very partial glimpse it is true, but still a glimpse of what goes on in one of the more respectable of the places where liquor is sold. And what a revelation it was! Selling on Saturday night into Sunday morning, and re-opening at 10 o'clock to continue the business. We forbear further comment. It seems needless.

FOUND \$3,500 IN A SHOE.

CHICAGO, Nov. 21.—In a shoe left in his shop to be repaired Axel Sorenson, a crippled shoemaker of this city found \$3,500 today.

The money was in the possession of Sorenson for just two hours, when the owner returned saying: "I think I lost a little package in here."
