Mr. Trivett went West as a missionary in 1878, and has a wonderful fund of information, anecdotes, stories, etc. of that then vast and desolate country. Particularly worth listening to was his story of his relations with the Indians. A number of baskets were sold by Senator Prowse, who proved himself a capable auctioneer. The bidding was keen, and the proceeds of the evening amounted to quite a large sum. After a vote of thanks had been tendered the lecturer, the proceedings closed, all feeling that they had spent a most enjoyable time.
