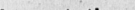

Valedictory read by Frances McNeill, at the closing of the Summerside High School, June 27th, 1933.

Colleges and university education is necessary for some but high school education is a practical necessity for the greater part of our population, and success in the different avocations of life, even the humbler ones, is much more difficult to attain without it.

High school education aims at training the intellect by acquiring a general knowledge of the arts and sciences especially the more practical ones, as well as the formation of character.

To be a success in any field of work one must have general principles and the will and character to follow them. This we get by education. Think of what our country would be without its statesmen, its professional men, without men progressing education. Think even of what our town would be if we did not have educated men as leaders in the different professions and businesses.

We see then, even from our own experiences and observations, that that educated men are a necessity for every community. Thus, that our community might compare favorably with other parts of our great Dominion, we too must have our educated men.

To render this service then to our country is the sole reason for the existence of our high school. Or in other words our high school's work is to give our town's children the opportunity of attaining this great and necessary boon an education.

But if we put into practice those principles which have been so well taught us and exercise the strength of will and character that we have acquired here we too shall have our measure of success and will be deemed worthy graduates of the old Summerside High School.
