**RAIDERS STRIKE HEAVILY AT WEST MIDLANDS TOWN**  
 LONDON, April 10 — (Thursday) — (CP) — German raiders struck heavily at a west Midlands town last night and reports reaching here early today indicated civilian casualties might be numerous. Rescue workers toiled amid a deluge of bombs. Raiding jets pounded the town for several hours. It was the second straight night of attack on the west Midlands. Other raids hit at the East Anglian coastal area, northeast northwest and western England. London had an alarm but no bombings were reported.  
 The new raids came after another devastating attack on Coventry Tuesday night, the heaviest attack since the fire and bomb raid of last Nov. 14. Many casualties were caused in Coventry and buildings erected since the last big attack were levelled.  
 The Germans were over the West Midlands tonight for the second night in succession and bombs were dropped in two areas.

**Crop Rotation For The Dairy Farm**

(Experimental Farms News)

By Crop rotation is understood the growing of different crops in a regularly recurring succession on the same land, as opposed to a practice of haphazard changes without a definite plan.  
 Under a system of dairy farming a crop rotation should include corn or root crops, grain and legume hay, states P. O. Ripley, Field Husbandry Division, Dominion Experimental Farms Service. The cycle may be extended over as many years as desired, depending on the circumstances. For instance, a five-year rotation consisting of root crop, grain, legume-hay, hay or pasture and grain, is one which is well adapted to dairy farming. On an average 100-acre farm with 25 acres of unploughed land which could be used as pasture and 75 acres under cultivation, the cultivated land could be divided into five fields of 15 acres each and conveniently fitted into a 5-year rotation. In order to provide a balance of the various feeds only 10 acres of corn for silage would be necessary. In one field, therefore, corn could be grown and the remaining 5 acres in the field sown to grain. Two of the remaining fields could be used for grain such as oats and barley and two for hay or pasture arranged in the sequence outlined above. This would provide 10 acres of corn, 35 acres of grain and 30 acres of hay which produce, on the basis of average yields, 100 tons of corn silage, 52,000 pounds of grain and 60 tons of hay. This amount of feed would be sufficient for your horses required to operate the farm and twenty cows, together with several head of young stock.  
 The above plan is an illustration of how a rotation may be set up. Modifications of this rotation can be made to meet particular circumstances. A well planned rotation should provide a sufficient amount of the coarse feeds for the amount of livestock kept. It allows for a more equitable distribution of labour and facilitates weed eradication and maintenance of soil fertility. For further information in regard to crop rotations write the nearest Experimental Farm Agricultural College.

**Spanish Eggs**

6 eggs  
 2 strips bacon  
 1 tablespoon flour  
 1 small onion, chopped  
 2 cups canned tomatoes  
 1 green pepper chopped  
 2 tablespoons parsley  
 1 cup chopped celery  
 Salt and pepper  
 Cook eggs until hard. Remove shells and cut in half. Cut bacon into small pieces and fry until crisp. Remove bacon from fat. Cook onion in fat for a few minutes. Blend in flour. Add tomatoes, green pepper and celery. Simmer for 20 minutes. Add bacon and salt and pepper to taste. Pour sauce over eggs. Serve 6.
