In our day a large number of students writing an essay on "Democracy" the majority mentioned only the advantages of democracy while a few wrote of the responsibilities which democracy brings, which proves how lightly we regard our citizenship.

Mr. Murray continued "Historians tell us our Christian civilization is crumbling and we are only looking around to realize this fact. The foundation of our moral and spiritual life is being undermined by such forces as evil books and pictures. The sanctity of the home is being threatened by the evil of divorce proven by the fact that in America two out of every five marriages end in separation."

The Rev. Speaker quoted such noted men as Sir Alfred Zimmern, Gladstone, Wendell Wilkie and the world heavyweight champion, Jack Dempsey, who told a group of young men in Charlottetown, "We all need God, go to your churches" and "live clean lives." He then went on to show how interdependent all nations are and summed up the attributes of a good citizen as follows. "A good citizen must be well read, have wide vision, have a proper sense of values, have a concern for others and an appreciation of the franchise."

"By teaching good citizens may be developed. Japan, Russia, Turkey and Germany taught us a lesson in intensive teaching which we could use to our advantage in a program to Christianize through the church, the home and the school." At the conclusion of his address, Rev. Mr. Murray was tendered a hearty and unanimous vote of thanks, moved by Mr. J.F. Pendergast. The meeting closed by singing "God Save the King."

A good poultryman feeding generously of a balanced ration should have his hens back laying about two weeks after they have finished the moult.

The hen of today has to lay or start storing up extra layers of fat.

If you have some of these delinquents, market them, instead of throwing good feed down the drain pipe.
