MADE IN CANADA TRAIN.

MONTREAL, July 6—After a trip of 6,000 miles, the "Made in Canada" train which was run over the C. P. R. system as far as Edmonton, under the auspices of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, has just completed a most successful tour. The train made 148 stops in 40 days, remaining at each place on the schedule from 3 to 36 hours. The ten cars contained 54 individual exhibits, all made in Canada. Approximately 8,000 individual articles were on view. Everyone was a Canadian factory product of some kind.

Pasture and hay crops are especially good. Fruit trees at the end of May were just coming into bloom. Cherry trees in some parts were in full bloom. Some damage was caused by frosts about the 22nd and 23rd of the month.

LABOR VOTE.  
LONDON, July 6—Premier Asquith's shaky parliamentary combination has just weathered another crisis which for a time portended a serious smash. The seats for Hanley and Crewe being vacant, the liberals Proper, put up candidates in both constituencies. The laborites promptly demanded the withdrawal of the liberal candidates, asserting that the seats belonged of right to the labor party.  
The liberals argued that the previous occupants of the seats were more liberal than laborite, but the leaders of the latter party would not listen to the argument, and began blustering and threatening.  
They first announced that if the liberals did not withdraw, the laborites would run a candidate in every vacant borough hereafter, implying that this would cause a liberal defeat by splitting the votes.  
The liberal whip—the Master of Elibank—refused to be terrified. He told the laborites that they might do as they pleased. The liberals had the right to put up candidates where-

ver they pleased and would not admit that the laborites had any prescriptive right to either Hanley or Crewe.  
Then the laborites became more enraged and announced that they would call on their whole representation of 41 members from the house of commons during the pendency of the election, and would send the men out to hustle for the labor candidates.  
The Master of Elibank still refused to budge from his position, and other liberal leaders outside the ministry, expected fatigue at the constant dictation of the laborites.  
As a result of the row, the laborites held a two-hour's powwow yesterday, which ended by their timely adopting a resolution that only members needed should be sent to Hanley or Crewe, and that there should be no general desertion.  
This is obviously a considerable breakdown. The fact is the government is not wholly dependent on the laborites for a majority in the house of commons having 267 liberals, and 84 Irish votes—a total of 351, against 278 unionist votes, or 73 plurality.  
Even should the 41 laborites make a junction with the unionists, they should not upset the ministry, which could still have an absolute majority of 32. It is, therefore evident, that the laborites are only useful, and not essential, to the government, and that they are wholly dependent upon the cabinet for labor legislation.  
In spite of this condition, it is prophesied that little will be heard of the home rule bill till after the adjournment in August, but the bill will be urged to its passage by a drastic application of the closure in October.
