OBITARY.—In the death of Charles Worrill Townshend, Esq. who after many months of suffering borne with exemplary patience and resignation entered into rest at his home at Rollo Bay, Lot 43, on Saturday the 29th of Dec., the community has lost an esteemed and useful member of society. A sincere and devoted friend and a fearless and zealous advocate of the rites of the church, a constant and honored member who adorned the office of elder by a pious and blameless life, and to his family a wise, considerate and loving husband and father to whom they were devotedly attached. Mr. Townshend was born at Bay Fortune in the year 1831, but when quite young, moved with his parents on to 150 acres of hardwood land fronting on Rollo Bay given to him as a baptismal present by the Hon. Charles Worrill after whom he was named, and which by unceasing industry and frugality he has converted in to one of the most productive and comfortable farm residences in Kings County. He leaves a wife, two sons, and three daughters. Both sons are married, one living in Charlottetown and the other on part of the homestead farm. One daughter is married to George Thompson, Esq. of the firm of Poole and Thompson, Montague Bridge, another to Mr. Alexander Campbell, of Rollo Bay, Road Supervisor. The other is at home with her mother. On Monday the 31st after a most appropriate impressive funeral service conducted by Rev. Mr. Polley pastor of the Souris and Bay Fortune Presbyterian Church, his remains were followed by a large concourse of friends and mourners to the cemetery at Bay Fortune where they were laid to rest in the sure and certain hope of a glorious resurrection.

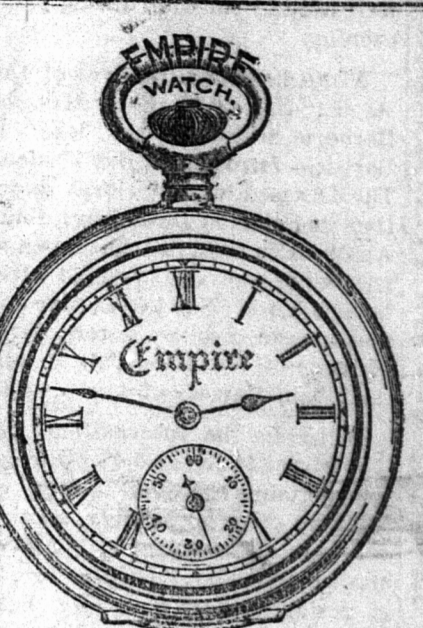
