Week's Review Of Activities At Y. M. C. A.

Over The Hills And Far Away

It has been my pleasant task, in connection with the travelling libraries of Dalhousie University, to suggest, sometimes, the names of books and authors that are little known. Especially is it a pleasure when it is a request for books suitable to boys in their "teens." One can always fall back on the old books, to be sure; it is a capital mistake however, for an older person to insist exclusively, for youth of the present, on the books which nourished his own youth. But how can one discover what present day youth likes? (I sometimes hear the question put in tones of despair). Yet the answer is surely simple and easy: by experiment. I give here, then, the names of two authors of great merit whose books are read with avidity by any boys fortunate enough to encounter them: Denis Reitz, author of Commando, and its sequel, Trekking On; and L. M. Nesbitt author of Desolate Marches, Gold Fever, and Danakil. The two authors have in common a most unusual freshness in their use of the English language, and perhaps for the same reason. English is not the native language of either. Reitz is a native of the Orange Free State, of very mixed ancestry; Nesbitt, though British on his father's side, was partly French, partly Italian. He lived in Italy until he became a student of a school of mining in England. Not that the English used by either author is in any way imperfect, or that it suggests a foreigner using English. I read an entire book of Nesbitt's believing him to be as British as his name, and then discover who he was. Commando is about the Boer war, seen from the side of the Boers, and yet a book which gives an Englishman great pleasure to read; he thought we were "fine fellows," if too well provided with food and ammunition. (Out of the surplus his guerrilla comrades kept going.) It is a thrilling book, without a touch of rancour or bitterness. Not often does a sequel to a brilliant book fail to disappoint. But Trekking on is an exception to this rule. It takes up the author life after

General Foods Employees Will Draw Pay If Sick Or Hurt

FOOD COMPANY ALSO ANNOUNCES NEW CO-OPERATIVE GROUP LIFE INSURANCE PLAN

TORONTO, Dec. 20.—Adoption of a non-occupational accident and sickness disability benefit plan for all employees, and a new group life insurance plan, is announced by R. K. McIntosh, Vice President, General Foods Limited. All costs of non-occupational accident and sickness benefits are borne by the company, while both company and participating employees contribute to the cost of the life insurance.

One week's benefit payment in the case of a salaried employee is his regular weekly salary at the time disability begins. In the case of an hourly-rated employee, one week's benefit is equivalent to two-thirds of his average weekly pay. Benefits are payable beginning with the first day of disability to salaried employees and with the eighth calendar day of disability to hourly-rated employees.
