—WAS HONORED SON OF WEST DEVON—In yesterday's Guardian it was announced in a Canadian Press dispatch from Canterbury, N. B., that news had been received there of the drowning at McCreary, Manitoba, of Rev. Reginald Vincent, a native of P. E. Island and a United Church minister, who had held several pastorates in New Brunswick. The deceased was the son of Mr. and Mrs. William Vincent, of West Devon, who have received the news by telegram with, as yet no particulars of how the sad tragedy occurred. The remains are now on the way to his New Brunswick home, where the bereaved widow and an only child reside, for burial. The late Rev. Reginald Vincent, news of whose tragic death has deeply touched the community at West Devon, was ordained to the ministry only a little over two years ago and had a brilliant career before him. Besides his sorrowing widow and child, there are left to mourn his parents, two brothers and one sister, residing at West Devon, for whom deep sympathy is expressed.

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LIVESTOCK REPORT

MONTREAL, Que., July 23.—There were 131 cattle, 258 calves, 491 hogs and 108 sheep and lambs for sale on the two markets.

Cattle were selling on a basis of \$7.50 to \$10.50 or \$10.75 for steers, \$5 to \$7.50 for cows with odd tops to \$7.50 to \$9.50 for steers, \$5 to \$7.50 for hogs weighing around 900 pounds for \$7.50 to \$8. Bulls were in fair demand at \$5.50 to \$7 for bolognas with the bulk between \$6 and \$6.50, but sellers were working hard for prices quoted and the trade were not predicting higher prices. One mixed lot of 45 good calves were sold for \$12.25. Medium to good veals brought from \$10 to \$17.50 and four good calves averaging around 200 pounds reached \$14. Common calves and grassers including drinkers were sold for \$7 to \$8. Lambs were steady at \$14. Sheep were from \$6 to \$6.50. Hogs were firm at \$14.75 to \$14.85 for those of good quality fed and watered flats. A few small sows were made at \$15. Feeders brought \$14.75 to \$15, and sows were from \$8 to \$8.50. Hogs were firm at \$11.50. About 150 heavy hogs were left unsold from yesterday's market and for these there was no demand.
