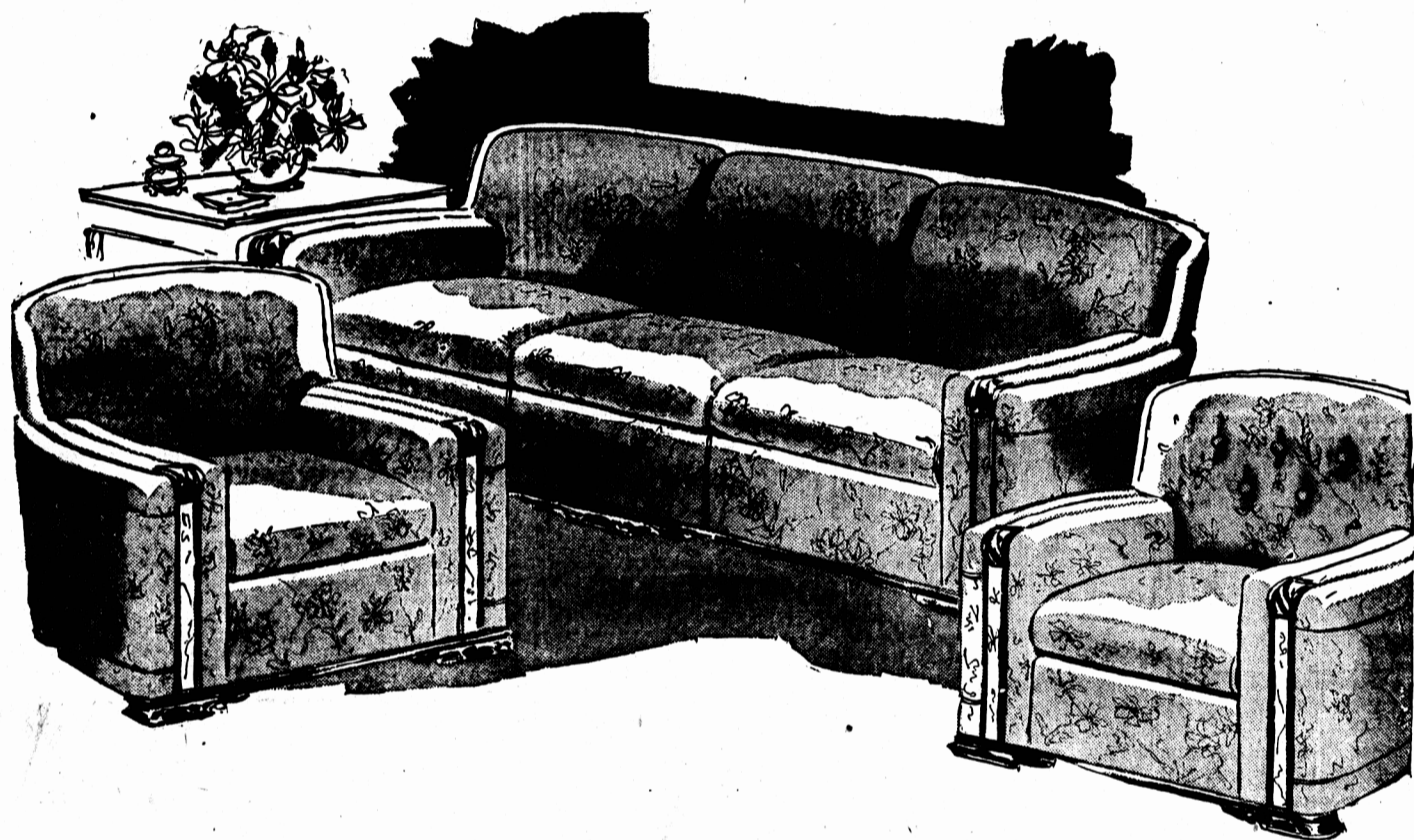


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"WHERE OLD FRIENDS MEET"

The new Diesel locomotive made its first regular run on the evening train on Friday night when it pulled into O'Leary station one

hour behind schedule. The new locomotive attracted quite a bit of attention. It had previously made a trial run but Friday was the first time it was used on a regular train. It is one of eighteen to be used by the C. N. R. in P. E. I. and has 660 horsepower, weighs 72 tons and has a maximum speed of fifty miles an hour and can travel approximately four hundred miles without refueling. They will be used for passenger, freight and switching service on the Island.

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
