ANCHORS TAKE OPENING FOOTBALL GAME 6-0

Football Season Gets Away To A Good Start on Saturday Afternoon At Victoria Park.

On Saturday afternoon at Victoria Park the Anchors and Stars football teams opened the football season when they clashed in what could be termed a real, good, football game for a starter.

Both teams put an aggregation of players on the field that surprised the fair gathering of fans. It was the unexpected that happened in both cases, the first being that the City League players could get sufficient men interested to turn out and practice and get the first game played on schedule, the second surprise was the Anchors' success with the game, 6-0.

The game for a beginner was full of snafu and pep and the two sides stood right up to it until the last minute of play, they were both evenly matched and neither could claim dangerous territory for long. The two touches, which were not converted, were made in a clean cut way and after some nice combination had preceded it, Neil McDonald, on a pass from Geo. Connelly, nifty after the twenty yard run was responsible for the first touch, and Joe Lonergan, from a pass from Len Connelly after a twenty-five yard run scored the second touch just a half minute before time was called in the last period.

Starting the game one man short the Stars were somewhat handicapped but not to the extent of a six to nothing score.

The Stars took the kick and forced the play to the Anchors' twenty-five yards, where play remained for some few minutes, the Stars working to get in position for a score, but the Anchors played a smart defensive game and held their opponents at their ten yard line, when S. Diamond retired by punting to touch, from the pass out the Stars were awarded a free kick, and McDonald made the attempt to drop the oval over the bar, but it fell short only by inches.

From the kick the Anchors took a pass from McDonald made a dangerous attempt to score, but was brought down almost on the line by Diamond, who booted the oval out of danger. Here the Anchors were awarded a penalty kick which they followed and they dribble down to the Stars' twenty-five yard line, S. Ryan, the Stars' full back secured the ball and made a dash for the goal for a good gain, but was brought down heavily by Lonergan, who was playing well for the Anchors in the front line, the Stars again work well up in Anchors' territory and Connelly and Walker made a bid for a touch, but were forced in touch at the Anchors' touch line, on the pass out C. Connelly punted to touch for a twenty yard gain and J. Connelly punted to touch field where the half ended, score 0-0.

The Anchors opened the second half with their mark at the Stars' twenty-five yard line, only to fail in his attempt for a penalty kick, the Anchors here were taking every advantage and forcing their opponents, getting the ball out of the scrum and getting it back to their halves who were making nice runs for good gains.

The Anchors pressed up gradually to the Stars' five yard line, and Geo. McDonald, who made a brilliant run around the Stars' and planted the oval right behind the bars, in kicking for goal the ball touched the ground before McDonald was ready for the kick and the Stars charged, the kick fizzling, touch from the pass out McDonald came and the Stars came down from the kick off determined to even things up, but the Anchors having once got a sight of victory were not easily turned aside, and Scantlebury and Saunders got in some of the best combination and runs and once again the play was dangerously close to the Stars' line and they were again forced to rouse.

From the kick the Stars went down and this time came close to getting across the line, when the Stars' half line worked some good combination, ready being forced in touch just at the line.

On the pass out, Connelly and Dewar dribbled to safety and Gormley increased the safety zone on a nice punt to touch from the pass out Woolner punted to Diamond who returned for a good gain to touch from the pass out Shelton and M.
