STOLEN GOODS FOUND—The two pairs of rubber boots and the ammunition found on the ice near the railway breastwork on Friday have been identified as goods which were stolen some time ago from the boots from A. E. McEachern's store and the ammunition from the hardware store of Pennell and Chandler. Sergeant Bradley located another "find" at the railway yard Saturday morning in the shape of two overcoats which had been thrown across a pile of lumber. These coats were identified by Mr. Simon Joseph as the ones which were stolen from the front of his store on Lower Queen St. about a couple of months ago. The goods were only placed where found a short time previously, the thieves evidently becoming either conscience stricken or scared.

VALUABLE HORSES PURCHASED—Mr. W. J. Reid of the Department of Agriculture and W. W. Crosby, one of the most successful breeders of pure bred Clydesdale horses in this province, arrived Friday from Ontario, where they were sent by the Government to purchase a purebred Clydesdale stallion at the request of a large number of breeders. They report having secured a good Canadian bred colt rising four years that is to be delivered next week, and will be in service this season. They also were fortunate in securing the very high class Scotch bred six year old "Balarat", winner of second prize at Ottawa immediately on his arrival from the Old Country, and classed as one of the very best stallions in Ontario today. He is to be delivered in August, as he is under contract for service during the present season. Demand for heavy horses is particularly keen as a result of the great world-wide scarcity exists, partly due to the destruction during the war and the comparative high prices of live stock since. Now that competitive classes of live stock have fallen sharply in price, horse breeding will again become one of the best paying lines, and the Government in conformity with their progressive policy have taken the initiative in this particular, and will be commended by all interested in the advancement of the live stock industry in this province.

Miss Carruthers of Charlottetown was present and helped very nicely in the evening's business.

A VETERAN ENGINEER—Mr. J. G. Mason of Toronto, representing the London Daily Mail's History of the War and the Grollier Society, is in the city registered at the Victoria. Mr. Mason is an ex-service man, having served three and a half years as Acting Major in the Canadian Engineers and in the Imperial army with the Royal Engineers and was wounded in action. His three sons also served in the war, one of them also being wounded. Mr. Mason is a native of England, being a member of the Institute of Civil Engineers. He was for twenty years City Engineer and water works Engineer of Gullford, Surrey near London.

MR. ALEXANDER NICHOLSON

Late in the evening of Monday Feb. 14, Mr. Alexander Nicholson a very highly esteemed citizen of Hunter River passed peacefully away at the age of 66 years. The deceased had been at his work on the railway as usual until within a few days of his death. On Thursday Feb. 10, while sitting at the table shortly after the noon hour, some of the members of the family noticed him seeming drowsy and falling into a kind of stupor. They realized that something was seriously wrong and at once sent for medical aid but in spite of all that could be done he lapsed into a state of unconsciousness from which he never fully rallied and on the above date his spirit took its flight.

Besides a sorrowing widow Mr. Nicholson leaves to mourn the loss of a kind and loving father, six sons and three daughters. The sons are: Norman, Newport Vermont; James, Chatham N. B.; Robert, Boston; John, Manchester N. H.; and Willard and Everett Borden P. E. I. and the daughters are: Mrs. C. L. Ozer, Boston; Mrs. Edward Sanders, Frog Lake Alta; and Miss Eda at home. The deceased is also survived by two sisters, Mrs. Edward McNeville and Miss Sarah Nicholson both of Hazel Grove.

Mr. Nicholson was a man who was widely and favorably known. For 25 years he was employed on the P. T. Island railway and was for 15 years foreman of the Hunter River section and was regarded as one of the best men on the road. His kindness of spirit together with his faithfulness to duty made him a general favorite with all. Unless prevented by some good reason he was never off duty. He was faithful even unto death, for when falling into a state of unconsciousness at the beginning of his last illness he was worrying lest his men might not be able to carry on the work without him.

When a young man he was well known throughout the Island because of his being one of the outstanding athletes at the Scottish gatherings. For three successive years he held the championship of the Maritime provinces for throwing the heavy hammer and for putting the heavy stone. He also carried off a great many prizes in the different running contests.

Mr. Nicholson will be much missed not only in his own home where his gentleness of spirit and his quietness of manner made him beloved by all but also in the church; in the Sunday school; in the Orange Order; in the Foresters and in the whole community; in all these different spheres his place will be hard to fill.

But while all shall miss him and feel severely his loss, yet knowing that after a well spent life he now rests from his labors and has gone to receive the reward of the faithful, none would be so selfish and so unkind as to wish him back again.

The funeral which was one of the largest ever seen in Hunter River was held in the Presbyterian church at 2 p. m. on Friday Feb. 13. The services were conducted by the Rev. R. H. Stavert assisted by the Rev. George Ayers. A large number of Orangemen marched in the funeral procession from Mr. Nicholson's home to the church and at the close of the regular service, they held a service at the grave.

The floral tributes were beautiful and consisted of a pillow from the family; spray from the Womens Missionary society and the Mission Band and a pillow from the Foresters. The pall bearers were Messrs. Angus Nicholson; Hammond Bertram; Rufus Stevenson; Angus Stewart; William Bernard and Harry Paul. Interment was in the Presbyterian cemetery at Hunter River.
