THE MARKETS

MONTREAL, Que., June 19.—There was no improvement in the foreign demand for Canadian grain here today, and business was reported very quiet for export account, the tone of the spot market for oats was stronger in sympathy with Winnipeg and prices for car lots were marked up 1 to 1 1/4 cents per bushel. The condition of the flour market was unchanged. The demand for spring wheat grades was again of a very limited character and in consequence the volume of business was small and the market was quiet, with no change in prices to note. The trade in winter wheat flour showed no improvement and the market was quiet today, there being a lull in the demand from American buyers owing to the decline in prices in the market. The volume of business for local account was small, but the undertone was firm, and prices were unchanged. The market for standard grades of rolled oats was quiet, but steady. Prices for all grades of eggs were well maintained under a fair trade. Little business was transacted in butter but prices were steady. Extreme dullness marked the trade in cheese.

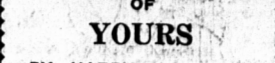

THAT CAR OF YOURS

THE OILING SYSTEM

This article might be started with the query "Have you changed the oil in your motor?"

Two quarts of good oil added to two quarts of used oil in the motor makes four quarts of bad oil for the motor. Oil must be drained from the crank case and the crankcase refilled with new oil every five to seven hundred miles. Use oil a little heavier at this time of the year. Above all, do not flush the crankcase with kerosene before refilling with new oil. It is impossible to completely drain the crankcase of this thin oil and it will severely impair the new oil that you have just put in. It is, however, feasible to rinse the motor with a half gallon of new thin cylinder oil before putting in the quantity required of new oil to remain in the base.

Be sure that all oil strainers are clear. Your service man will tell you where they are located. This is very important. A car will stop if the gasoline strainer is clogged so it will if the oil system is clogged but in the latter case it costs a great deal more to get it going again. The different types of oiling systems will be explained in the following articles also the care and attention to be given to each kind.

Ques.—What is the meaning and cause of a burned out armature and is it always necessary to get a new one if the one in the car burns out?

J. P., Murray River. Ans.—On Armature can "burn out" through different causes, namely, open circuits, shorts and grounds. The wire leading from the generator to the circuit breaker being broken or removed will cause a burn out or any open circuit from the generator to the battery will cause it.

Broken down or shorted windings in the armature rubbing on field will also cause it. The burn out is caused either by internal resistance or friction. It is not always necessary to get a new armature, but almost invariably advisable.
