H. L. Hewson, President and General Manager of the Hewson Wollen Mills, Ltd., Amherst, N. S., was in the City yesterday, and gave a representative of this paper some interesting facts concerning the firm's large and rapidly growing business. It is already generally known that Hewson tweeds are of very high quality, latest design and coloring, and not excelled by any other manufacturer. Last spring The Guardian gave an extended notice of the large new three story brick building 56 by 72 which was then being erected to give the firm necessary room to fill their rapidly increasing orders. This building, which added 10,000 square feet extra floor space, was equipped with a 200 horse power engine, 6 broad looms and 1 large twisting machine of 144 spindles. Although these additions meant the enlarging of the manufacturing capacity by 30%, increasing the output to between eight and nine thousand yards each week, the firm was on November first ast in no better position than previous to the enlargement, as the demand for Hewson tweeds had increased in like proportion. An order has since been placed for a carload of new machinery to add to the weaving capacity, and when this arrives it is hoped that orders can be filled more speedily. The above gives an idea of what can be accomplished by enterprise, perseverance and pluck, combined with a first class quality of the manufactured article, backed up by judicious newspaper advertising.

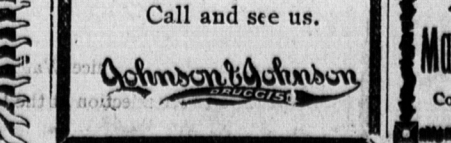
