
And then, quite suddenly, a shout rang out from the forecabin.

### Claim Property Worth A Billion

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Nov. 13.—Claimants to practically the whole of south Jersey and part of New York City, under a royal grant by Queen Anne of England in 1695, are again "preparing to take over their property rights," after an alleged seizure of 5,000 acres of land in Atlantic City.

Two hundred of the claimants, known as the "Martín, Steelman, Adams, Smith, et al., heirs," met here tonight to decide on a plan of action. Charles C. Frazier, chairman of the heirs' executive committee, is directing the fight.

According to Frazier, there are 1,000 of the heirs, and they lay claim under the grant to the entire island on which this city is built, 85 per cent. of Brigantine Beach and Ocean City, most of the mainland, and several blocks in New York city, including, among other properties, old Trinity Church, the City Hall and Woolworth building.

Other land claimed lies in Cape May, Cumberland and Gloucester counties, the entire value of the land claimed, according to Frazier, being about a billion dollars.

"We are offering," said Frazier, "to give clear title to the present illegal occupants of our ground for one-fifth of the present valuation, and about 100 of the present property owners have paid this to us."

"The leases on the New York properties, given by the ancestors of the present heirs for 99 years, expired in 1922, and they advertised for the heirs, as it was desired to buy the properties. There are \$60,000,000 waiting for us in New York city and we will complete the negotiations there as soon as possible."

Frazier, who lives in Pleasantville, five miles from the city, discussed the matter in dollar bills transfer deals in matter of fact fashion. He indignantly denied that the state police had driven a group of heirs from a section of ground near Estelville, N. J., which they recently took possession of in a body, raising an American flag.

"That report was untrue," said Frazier. "We took over 5,000 acres of land adjoining the Atlantic county game preserves and are still holding it. We have wood cutters there cutting down the trees for us. Mrs. Annie Winston, reported as the owner, acknowledged in our presence and that of the state police that she had no title to the ground taken by us."

Frazier said that as yet no one has appeared to dispute the claim of the heirs to the ground in question.

In a statement recently issued,

the heirs, after outlining their alleged rights, declare that "all who have held our lands have held them unlawfully, and will, therefore, be demanded to give an accounting to the executive committee at once for the profits gained thereby."

### SPICES THAT HAD A PART IN HISTORY
