Mr. Horne was one of the most outstanding men of the community and was foremost in every good work for the advancement of his native home. He has gone on before. Since sympathy goes out to the family in their time of sorrow. There are left to mourn besides his wife, formerly Ella Smallman, four sons and four daughters: Harold, David, George at home, and Kentford, who has been attending Acadia University; Eric, teacher in O'Leary; Annita, wife of Rev. George Seymour, New Port, N. S.; Mahald of Bloomfield and Laura, nurse in Littleton, N. H. The funeral was held on Tuesday, February 20th from the home of deceased and although a stormy day the attendance was large, about 100 sleighs were in procession. Services at the home and grave were conducted by Rev. A. S. Weil, pastor of United Church, Alberton assisted by Rev. A. B. O'Leary, Mr. Weil took for his text, Psalms 127 verses 1-3. The hymns sung by the request of the family were, "Unto the Hills," "O God Our Help in Ages Past," "There is a Land of Pure Delight," Mrs. Smythe was the organist. Among the lovely floral tributes were: pillow, from family; wreath, Seymour family; crescent, brother George; star Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Smallman; spray, Mr. and Mrs. W. N. GRANT BONFIRES SIGNALLED FETE
(Montreal, Feb. 28—Fete de Nuit, the annual celebration of local tobogganing enthusiasts, was held on the snow-covered slopes of Mount Royal here recently. Last of the great snow festivals for which Montreal was once famed all over the North American continent, the fete was carried out with the usual display of fireworks, bonfires and torch marches.
The main feature of the evening was the giant bonfire near the foot of the mile-long toboggan slide. It was made up of more than 100 oil-soaked casks piled to a height of about 25 feet. The lighting of the bonfire was the signal for the opening of the fete. Flares were then thrust into the snowbanks along the borders of the slide and toboggans loaded with gaily dressed enthusiasts came down the runways between them. The celebration was attended by United States and many parts of a large number of visitors from the Dominion.
